Established in 1957, State College of Florida, Manatee-Sarasota (SCF) is the region's first and largest public college. In the Fall 2022 term, nearly 9,000 college credit students were enrolled at campuses in Bradenton, Lakewood Ranch and Venice, and online. Each year thousands more attend professional development and personal enrichment classes. The College has graduated 61,176 students from 1958 to 2022.

Florida's performance funding system for state and community colleges ranked SCF among the high performing institutions of Florida's 28 state/community colleges. The model consists of four measures: completion rates, retention rates, job placement/continuing education and completer entry wages.

SCF is a dynamic College dedicated to meeting the educational and workforce training needs of citizens and businesses in the region. 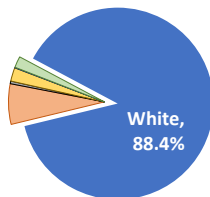

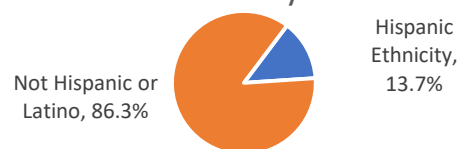

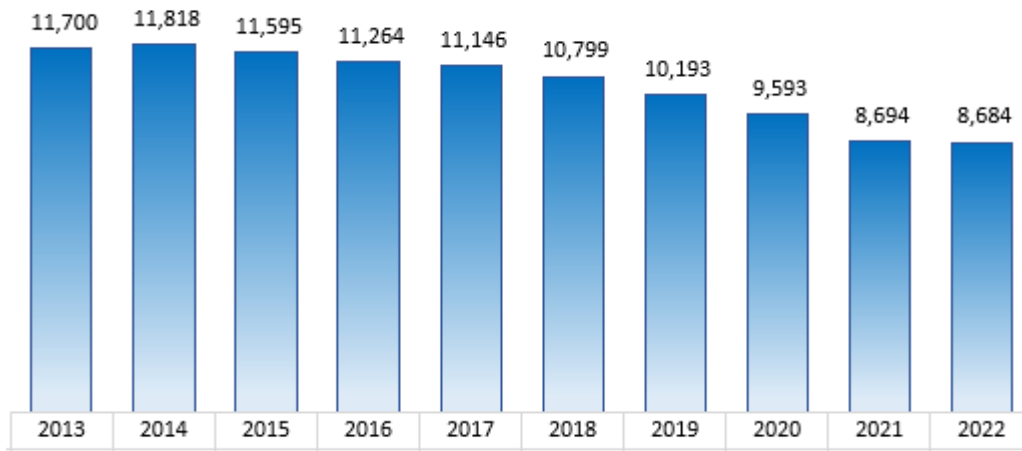

Fall 2013-Fall 2022 College Credit Enrollment Headcount *

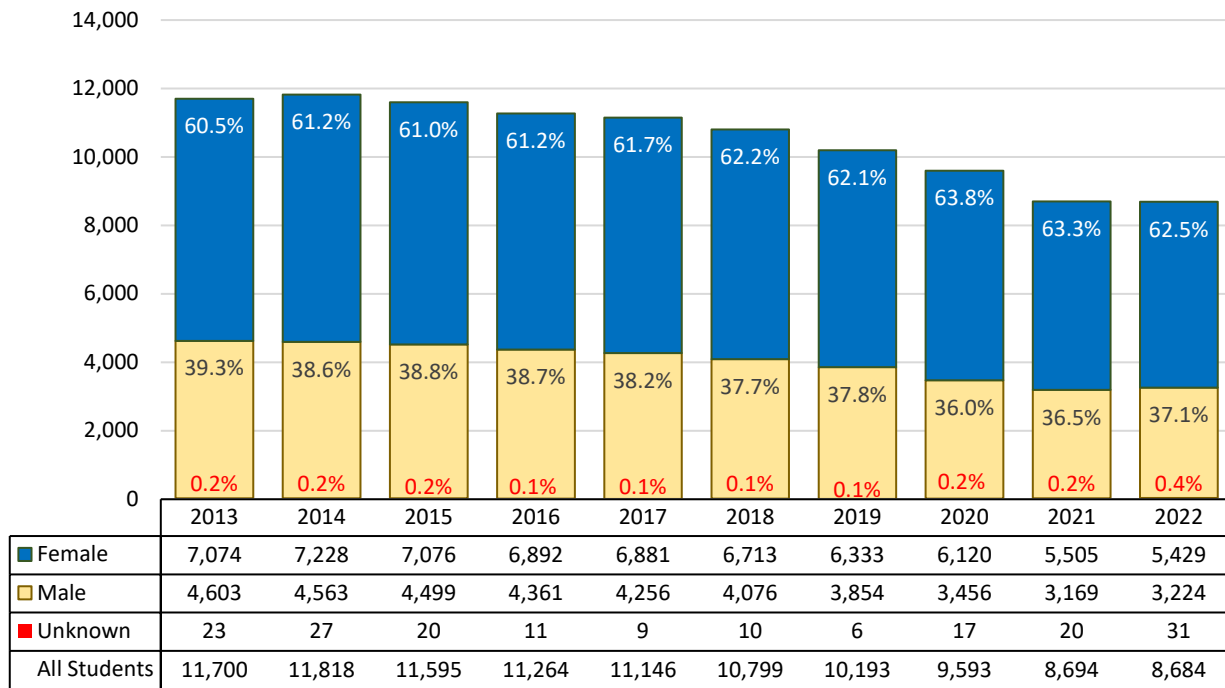

Fall 2013-Fall 2022 Credit Students by Gender *

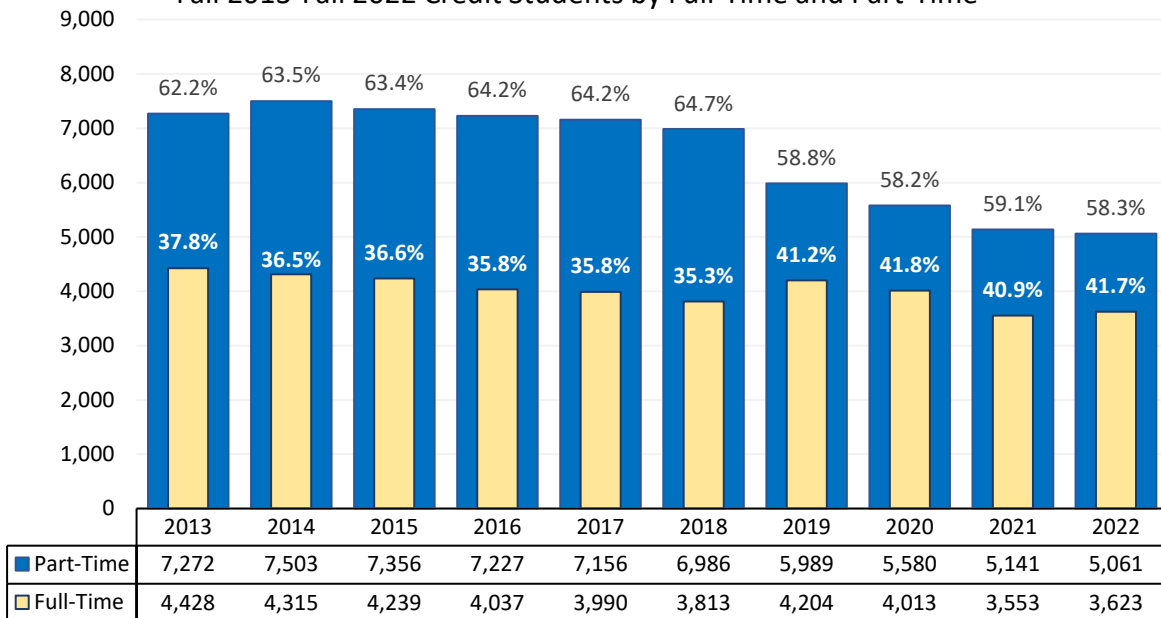

Fall 2013-Fall 2022 Credit Students by Full-Time and Part-Time *



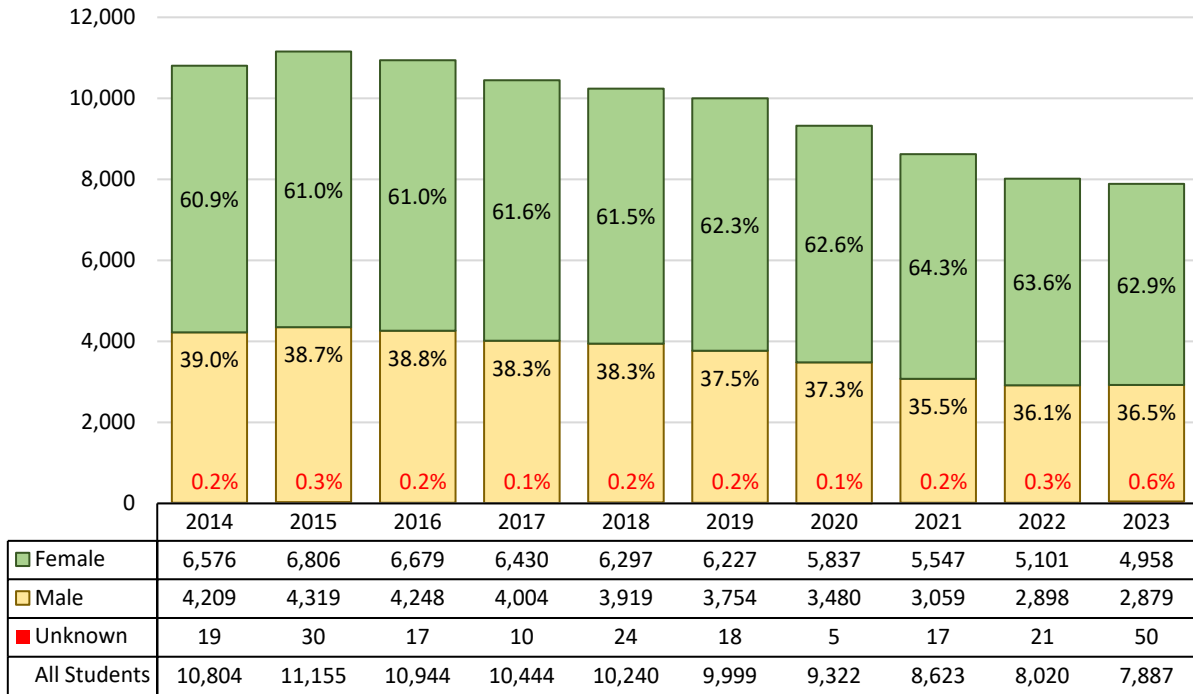

Spring 2014-Spring 2023 Credit Students by Gender *

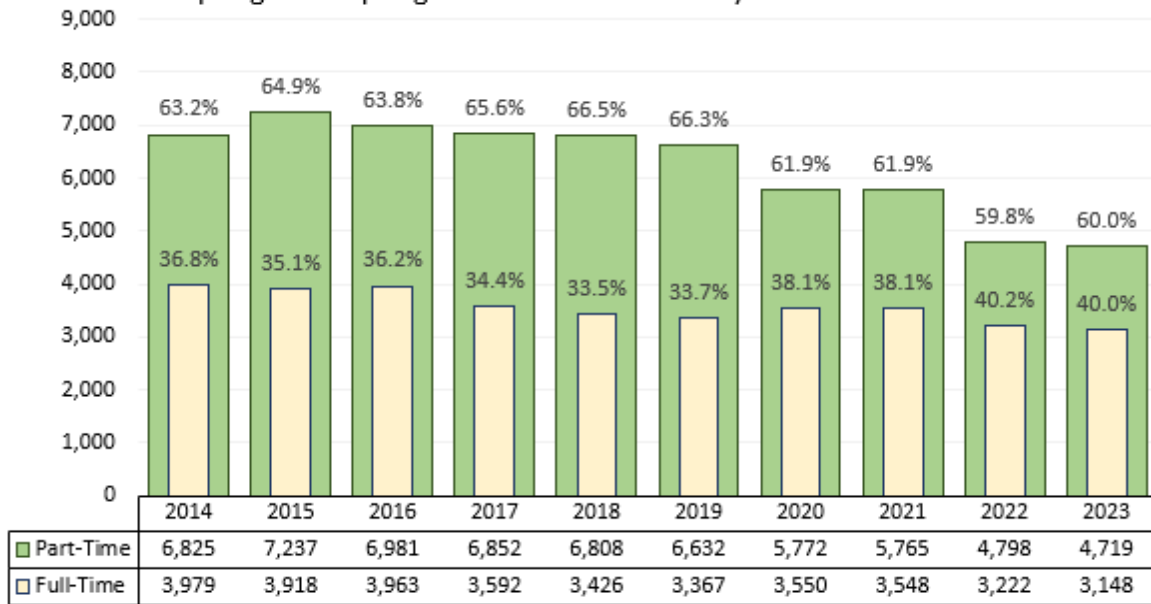

Spring 2014-Spring 2023 Credit Students by Full-Time and Part-Time *



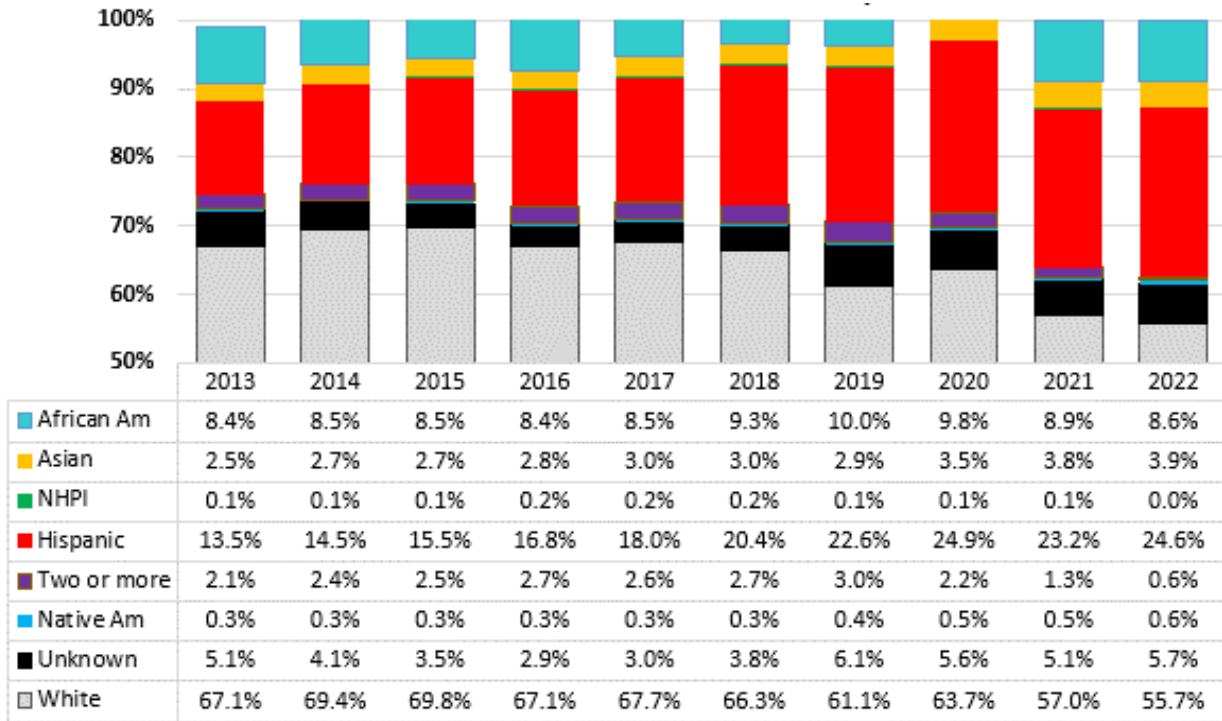

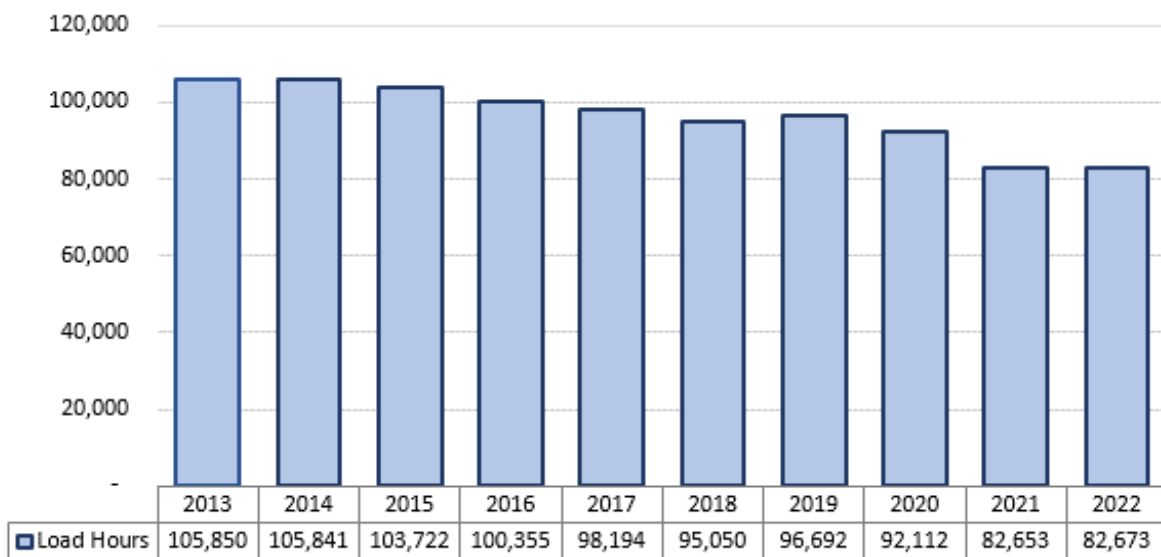
Fall 2013-Fall 2022 Credit Students by Race

Fall 2013-Fall 2022 Credit Students by Load Hours*

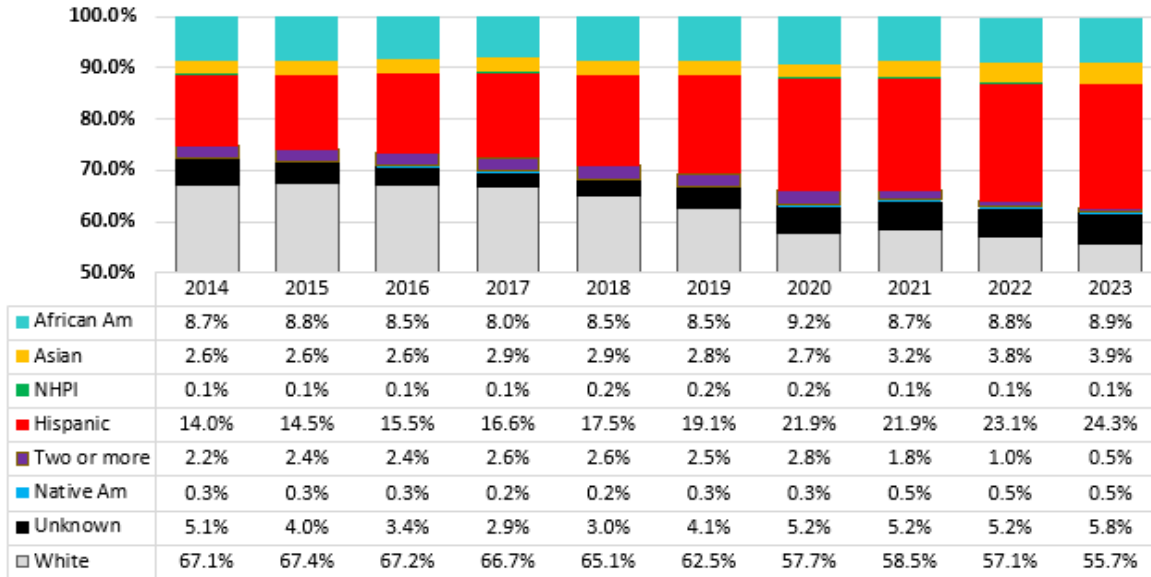

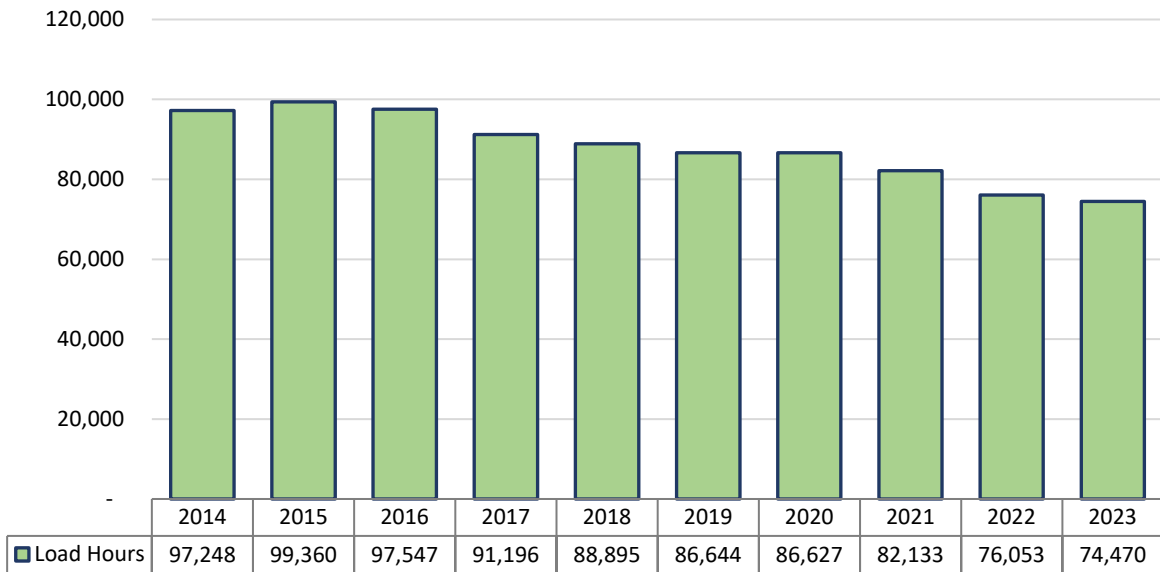

Spring 2014-Spring 2023 Credit Students by Load Hours*



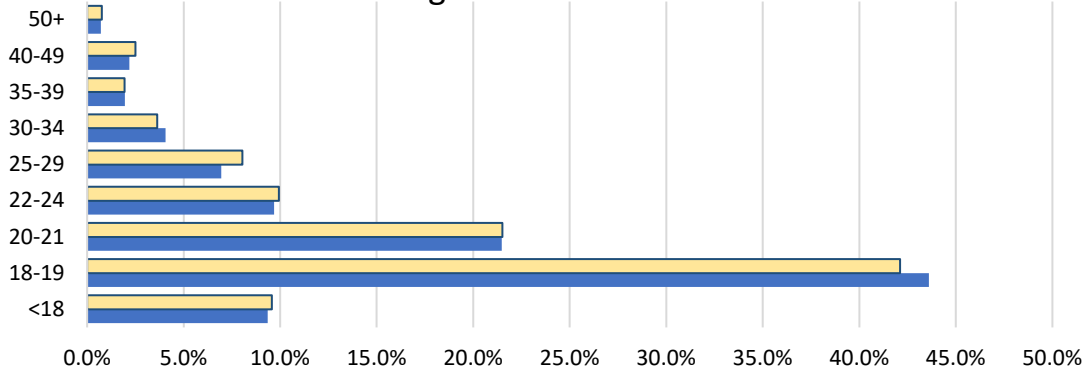

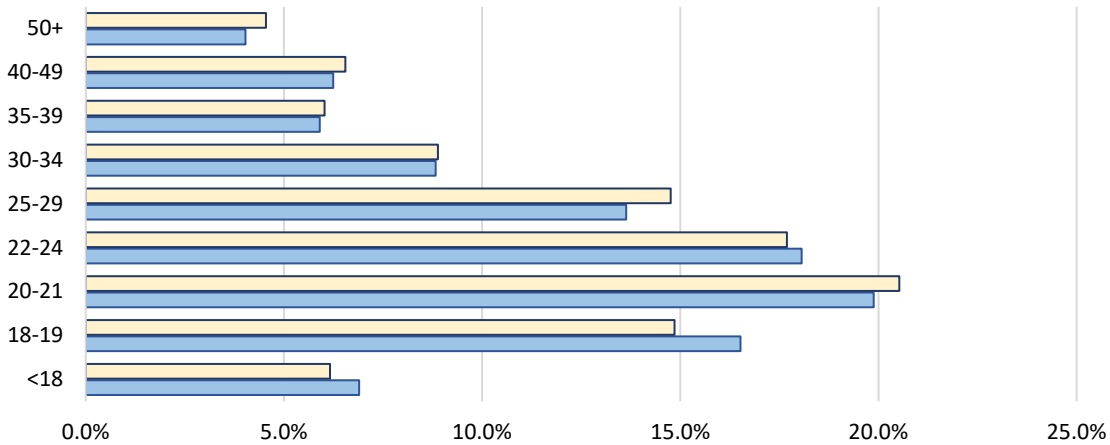

Fall 2021-Fall 2022 Age Distribution of Part-Time Students



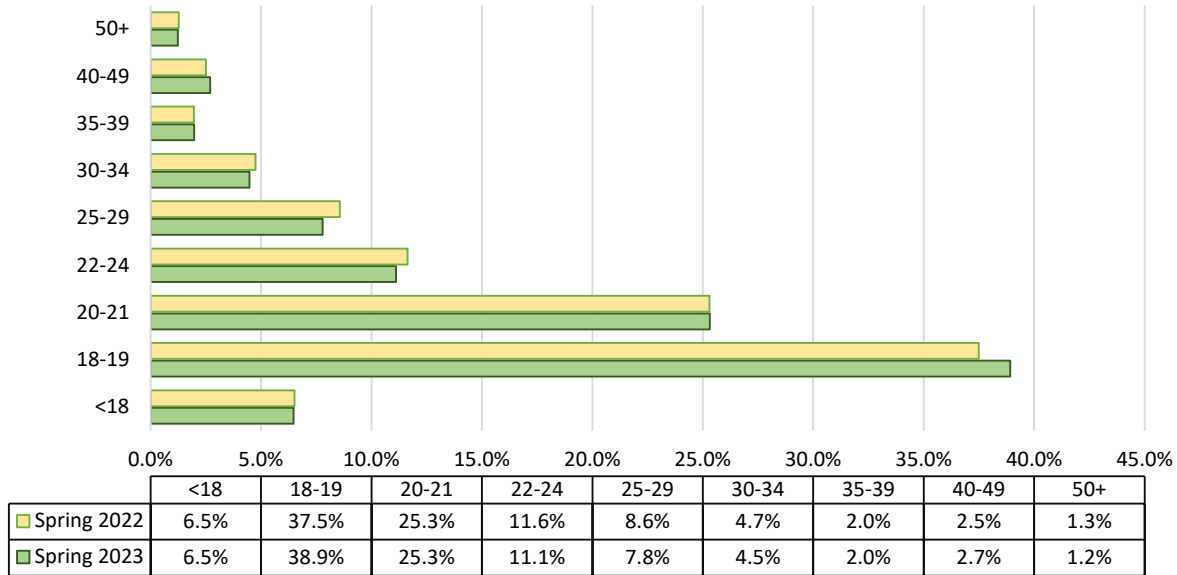

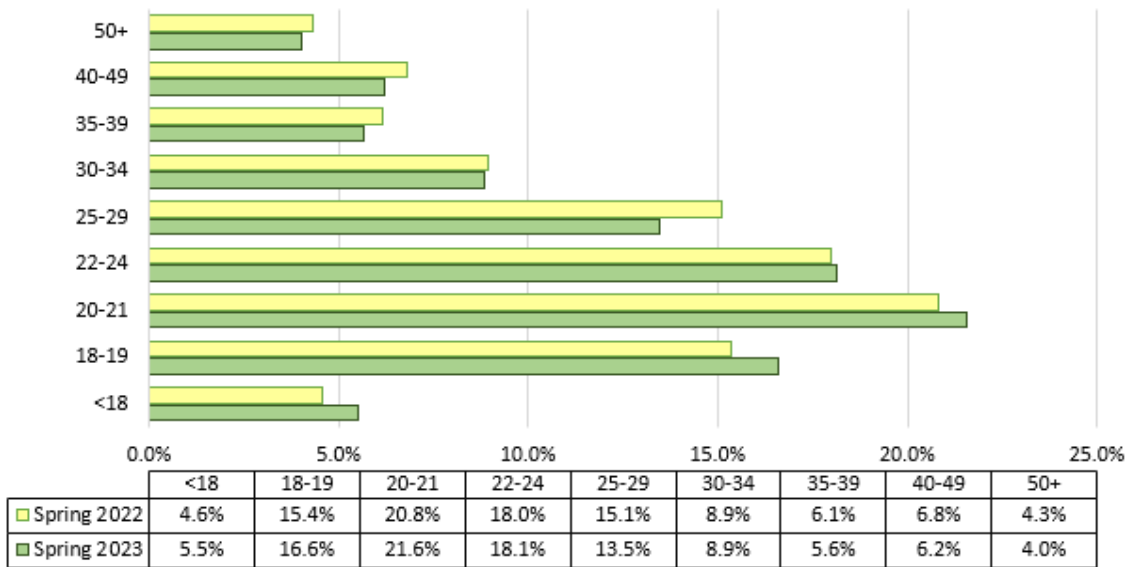
Spring 2022-Spring 2023 Age Distribution of Full-Time Students*

Spring 2022-Spring 2023 Age Distribution of Part-Time Students*

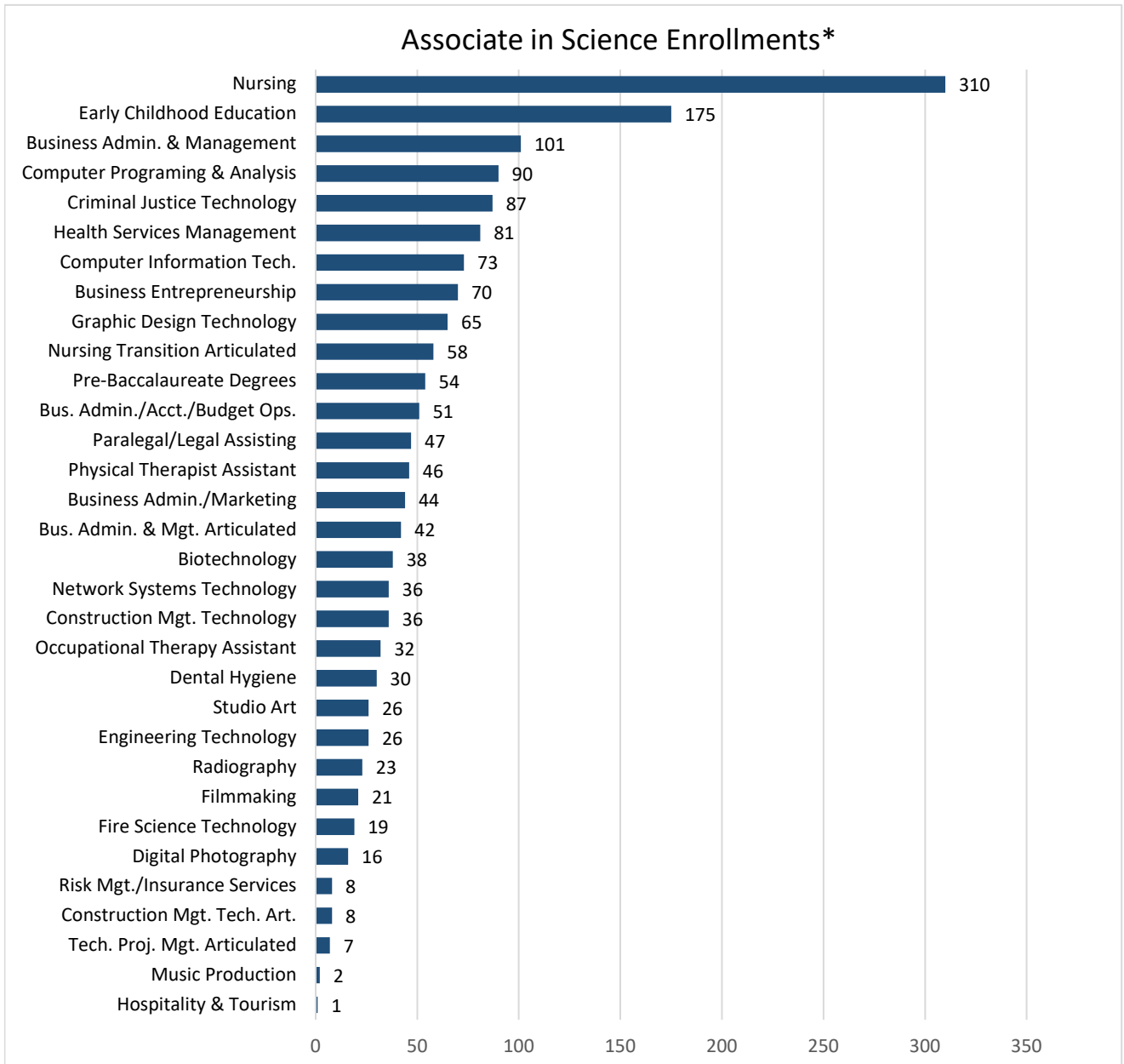
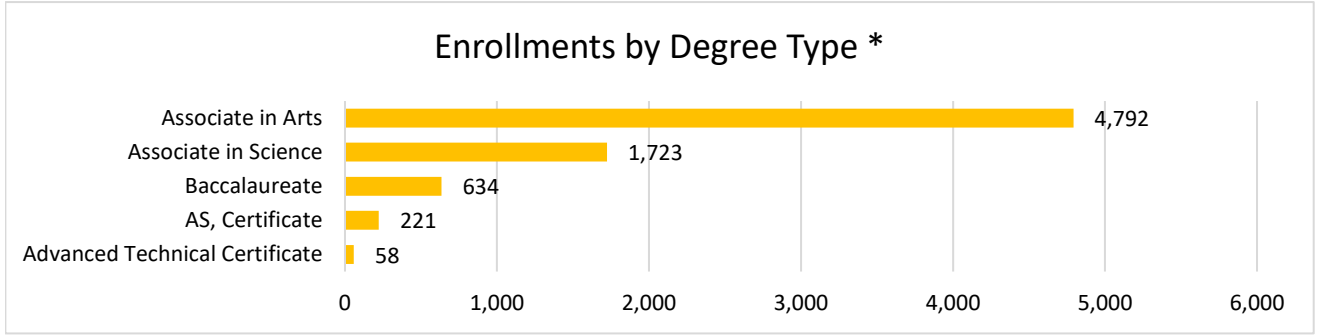

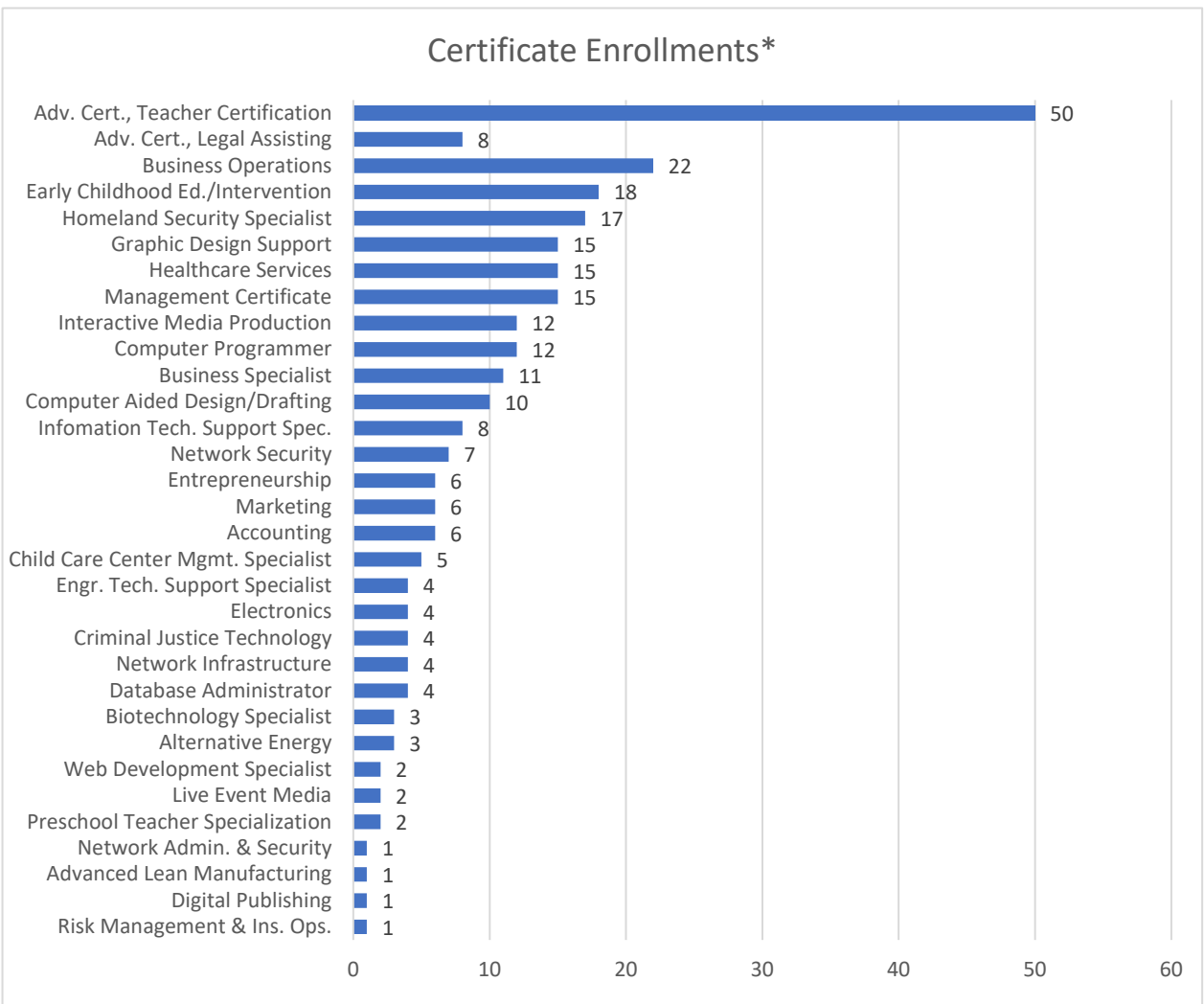

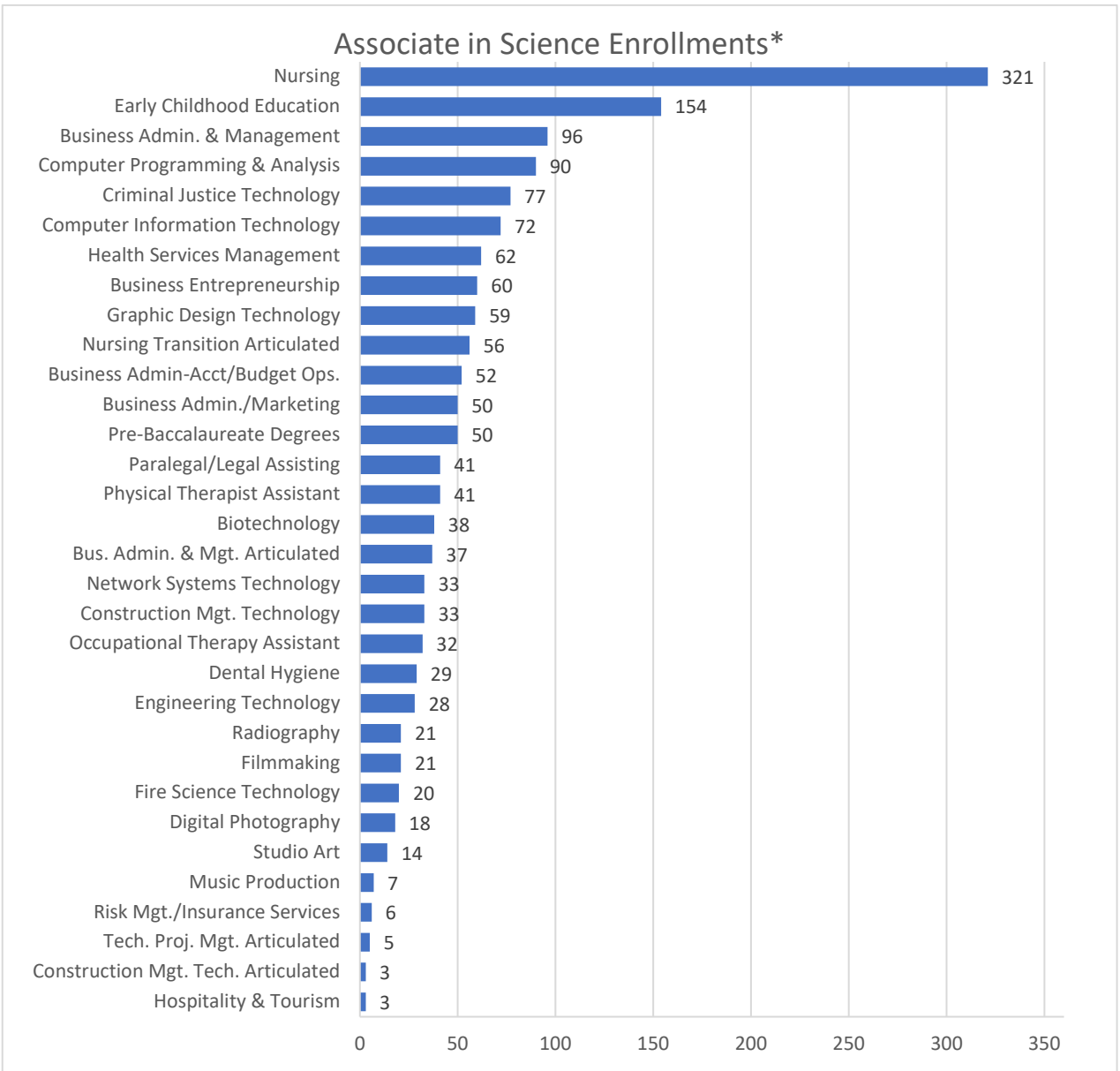
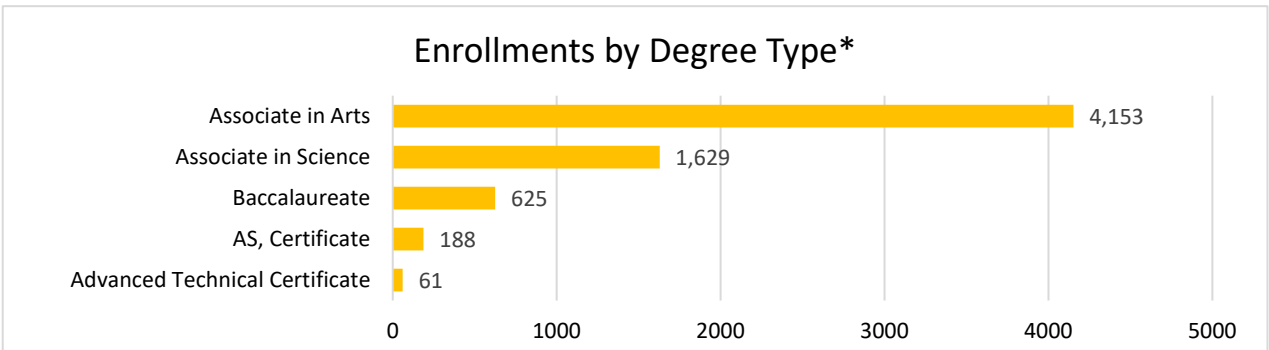
Fall 2022 Baccalaureate and Certificate Enrollments

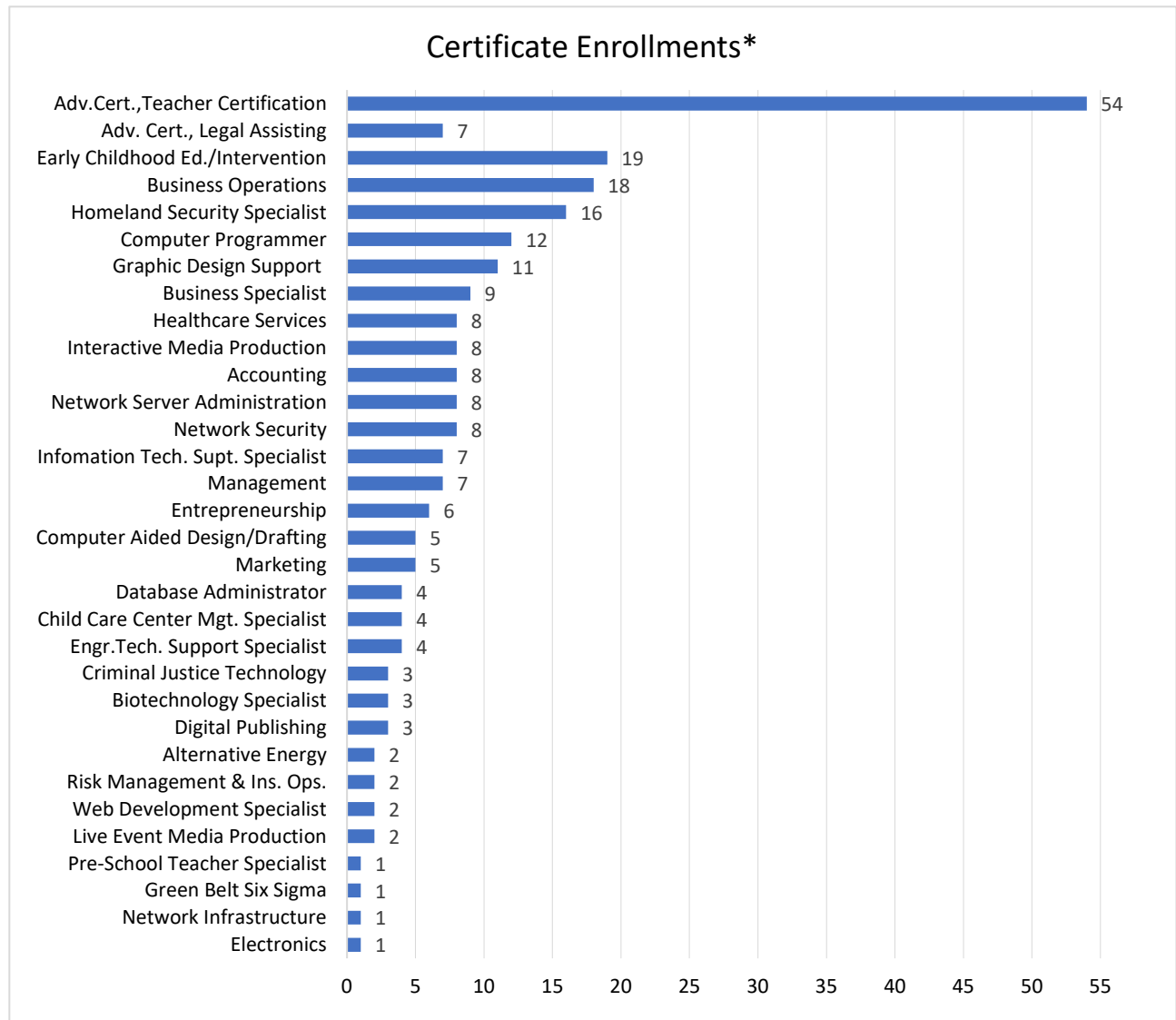
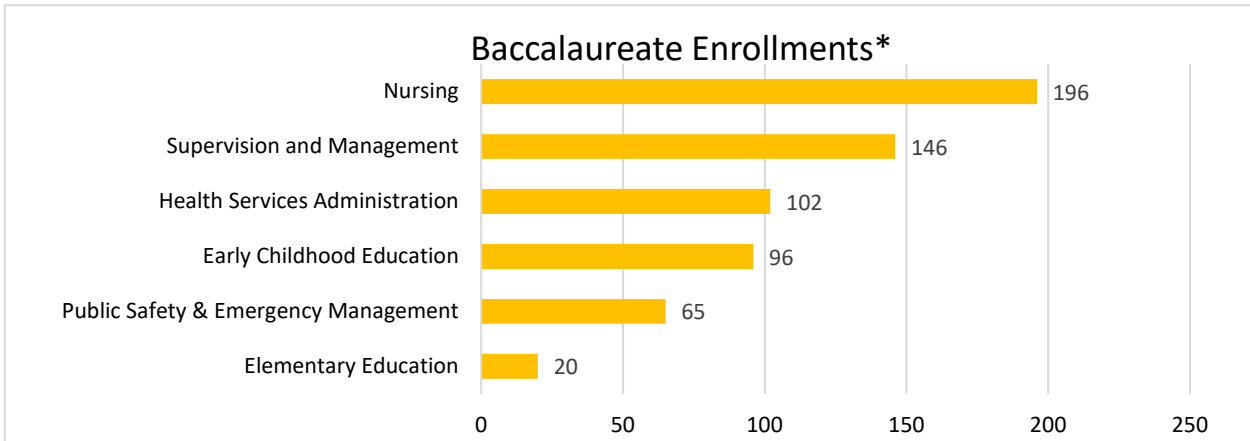
Spring 2023 Degree Types and AS Degree Enrollments

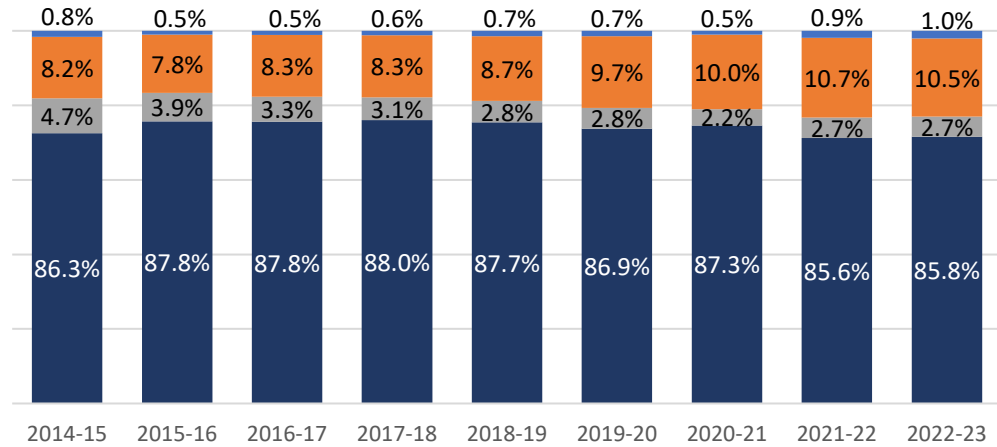

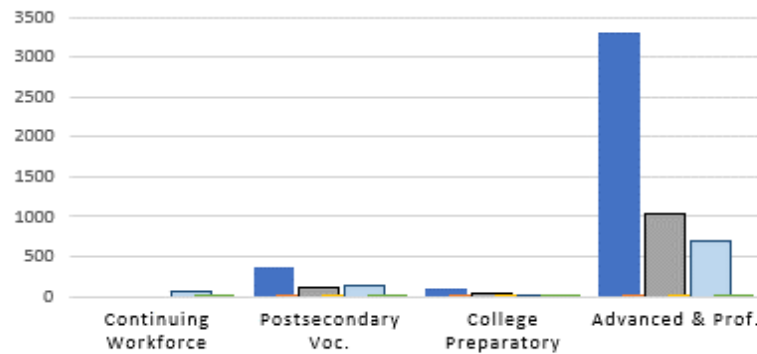

Funded Annual Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) Enrollment by Campus 2022-23*



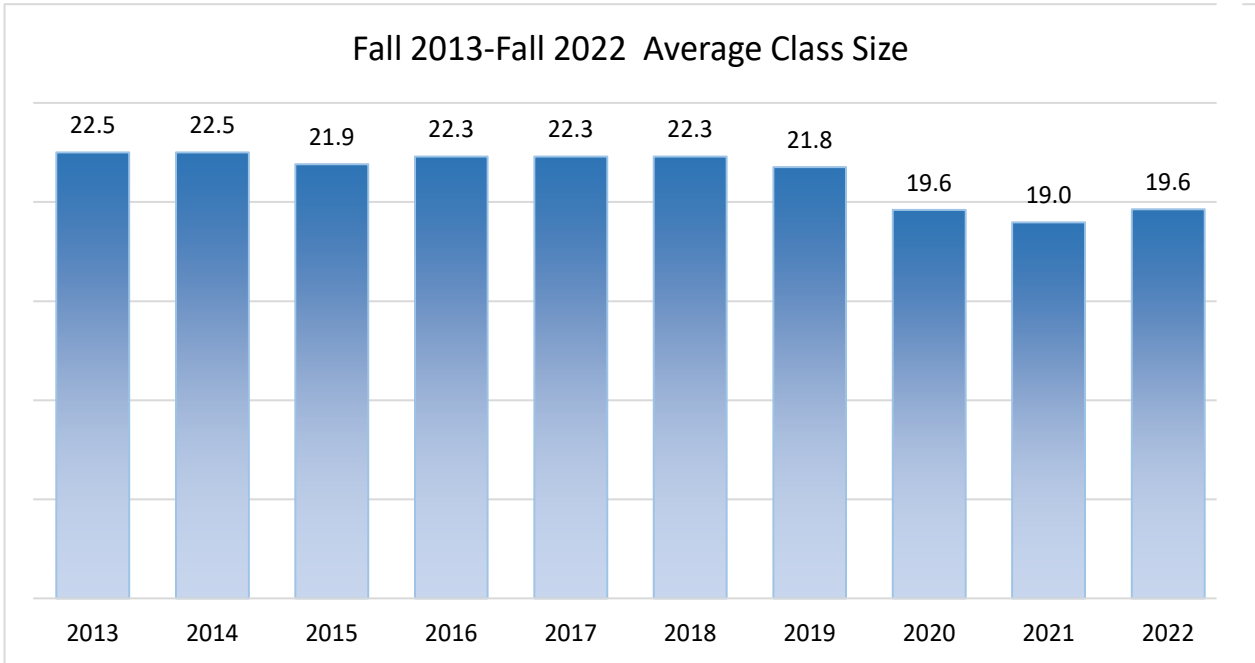

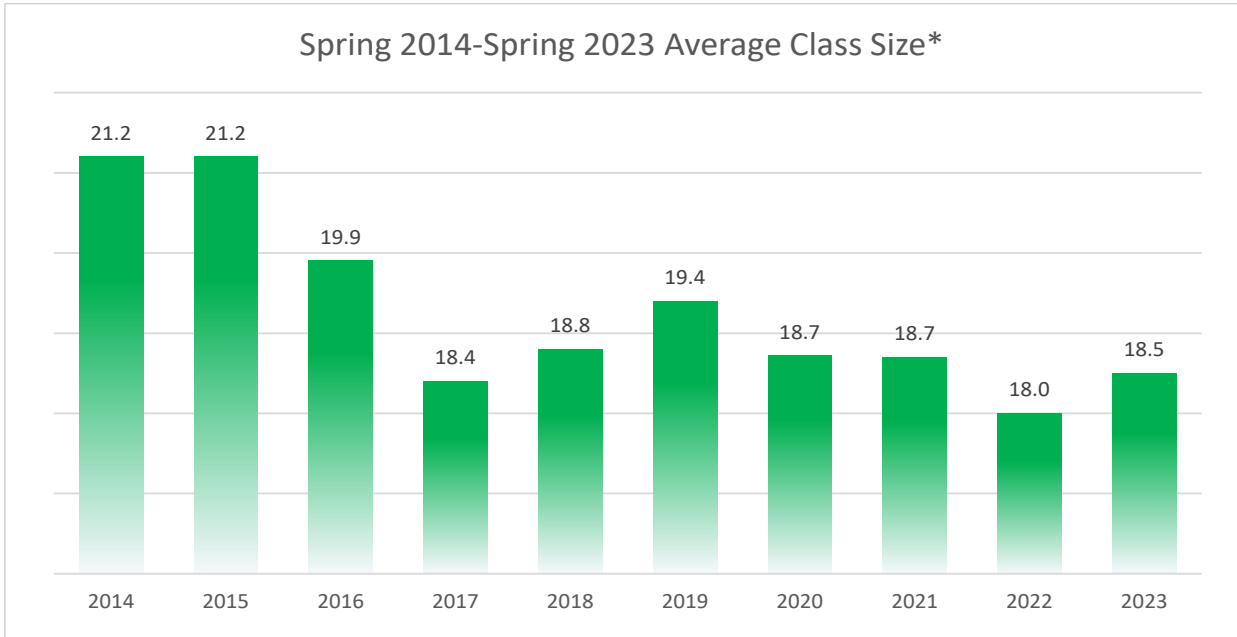

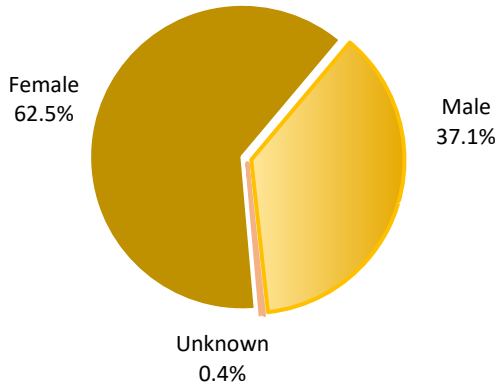


Fall 2022 Student Profile

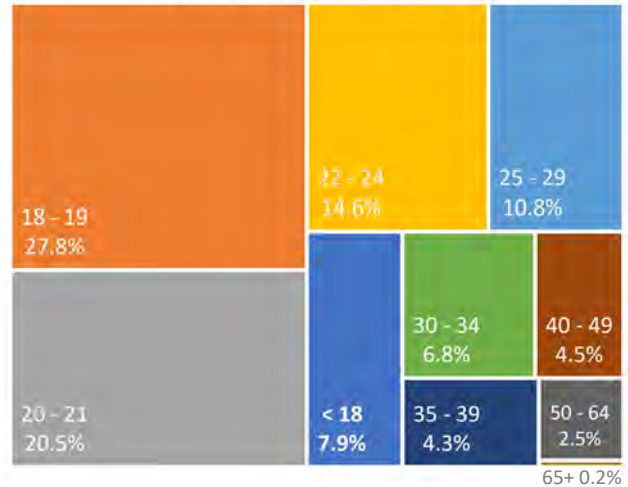

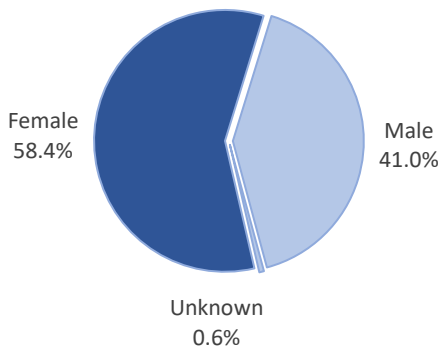
Fall Students by Gender



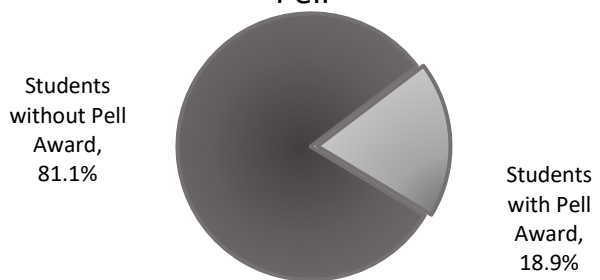
Fall Students by Age



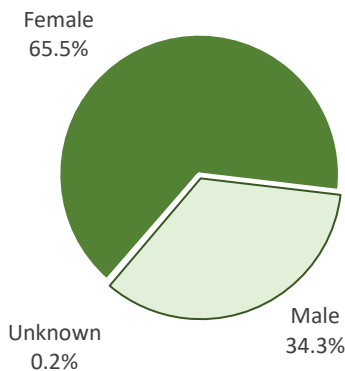
Fall Full-Time by Gender



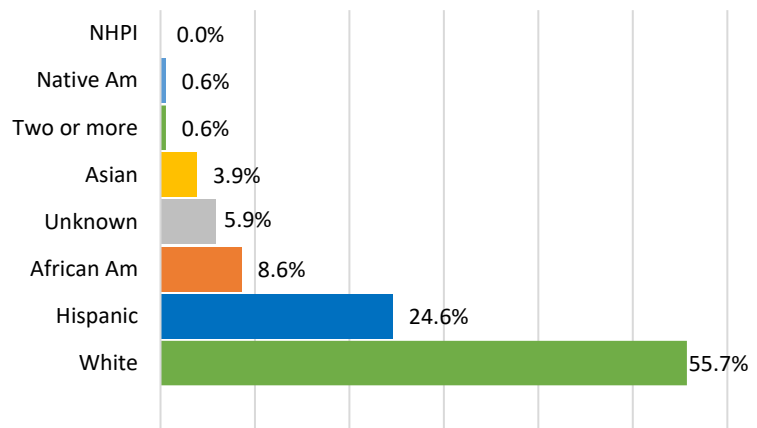
Fall Full-Time Students Receiving Pell

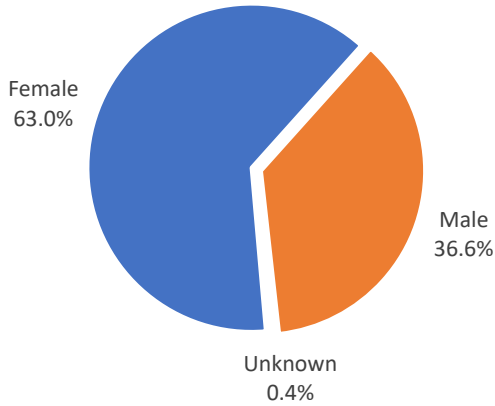

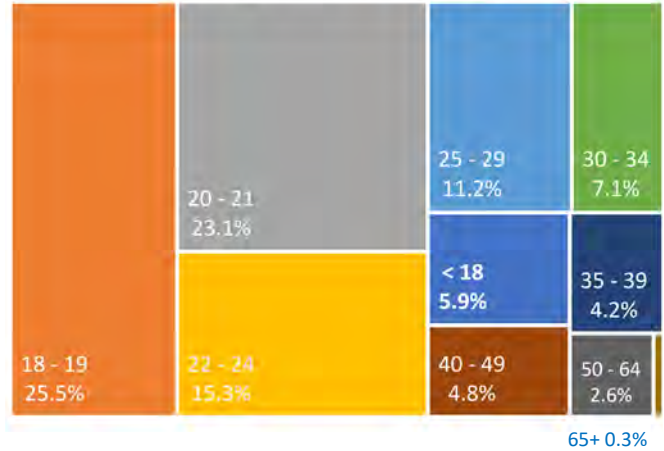

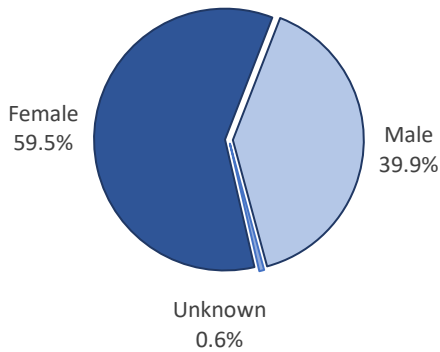
Spring Students by Gender



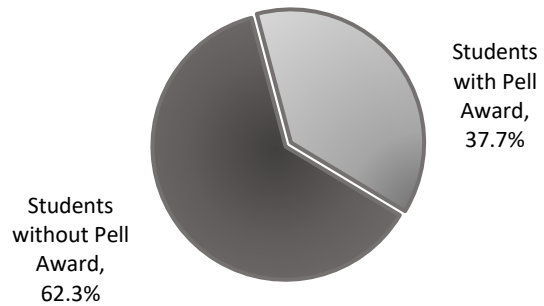
Spring Students by Age



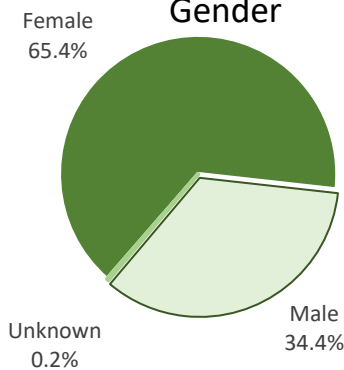
Spring Full-Time by Gender



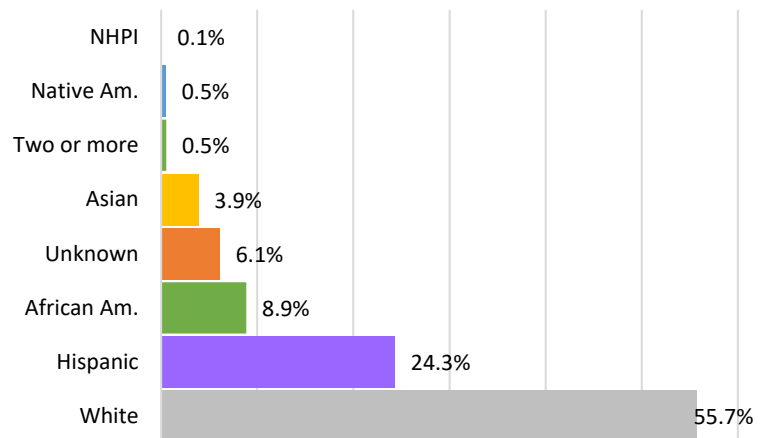
Spring Full-Time Students Receiving Pell

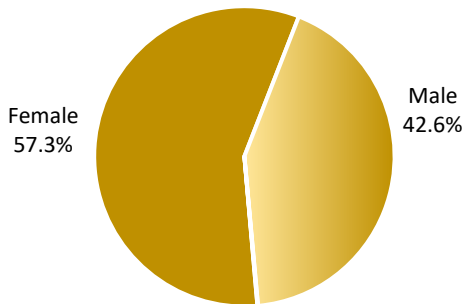


Fall 2022 Profile of First-Time-In-College (FTIC) Students

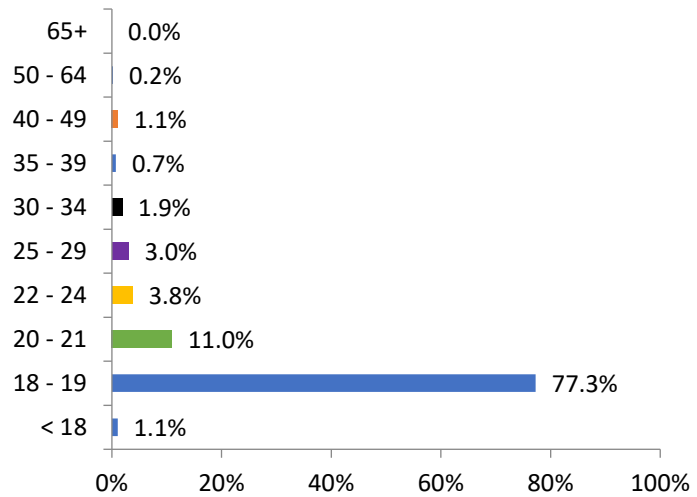

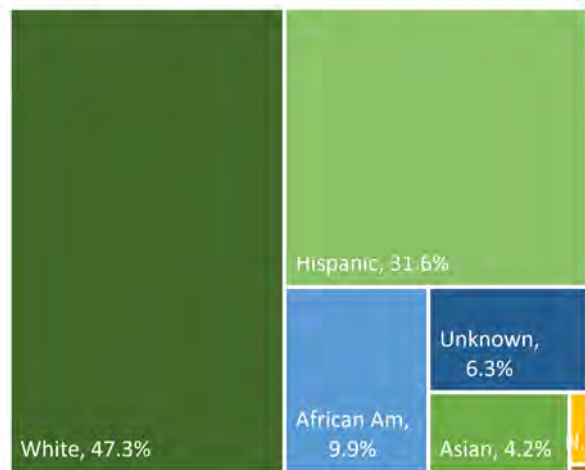

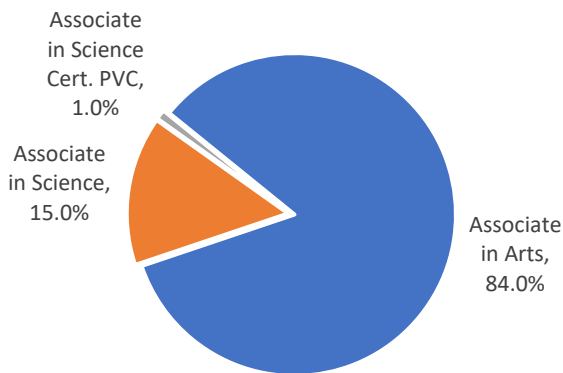

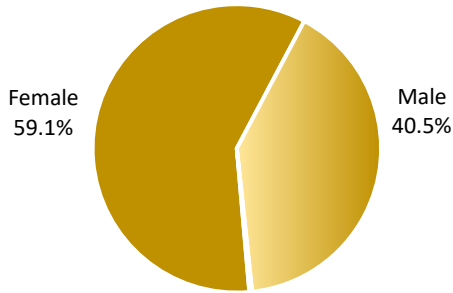


Spring 2023 Profile of First-Time-In-College (FTIC) Students

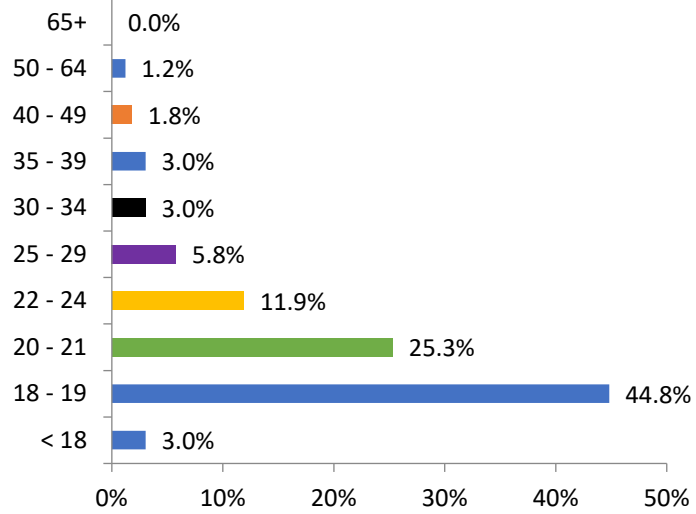

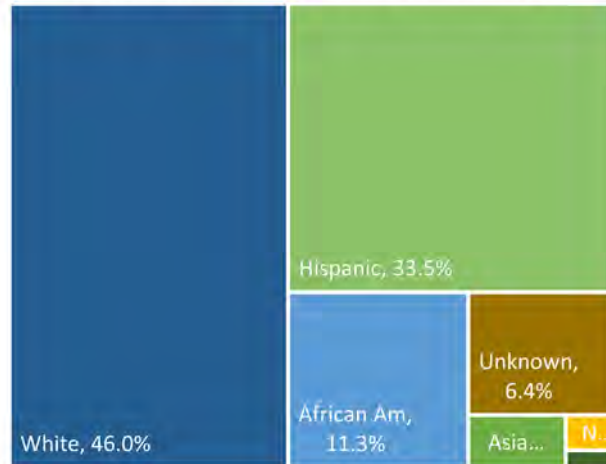

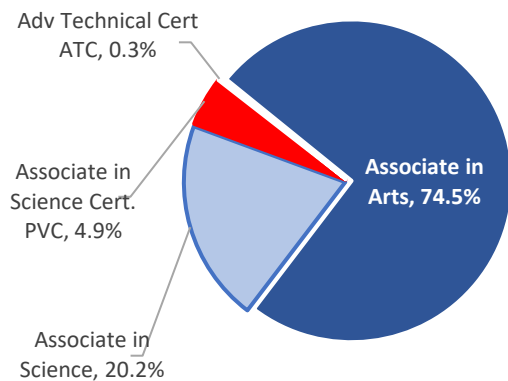

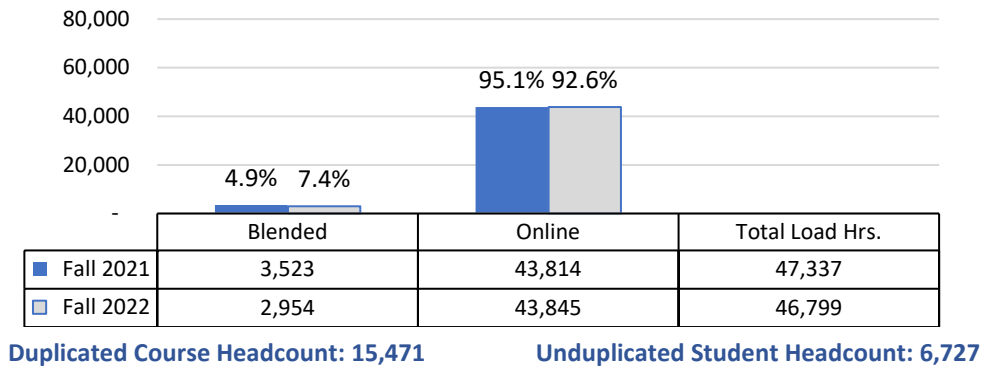
Blended and Online Learning Courses Summer 2022-Spring 2023

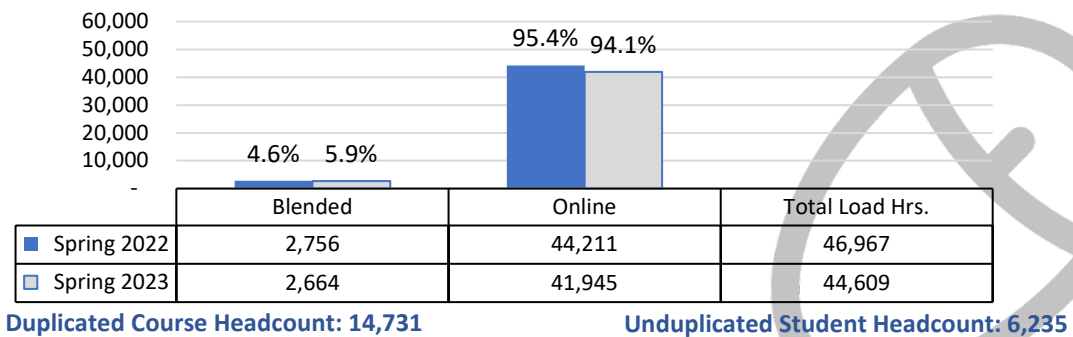
Summer 2022 Load Hours

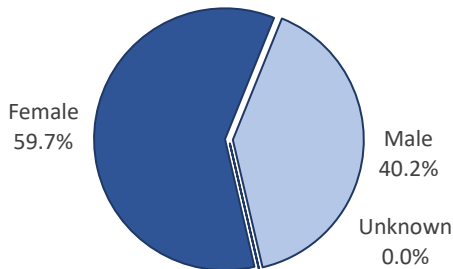

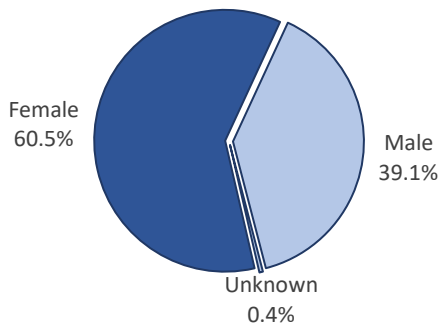

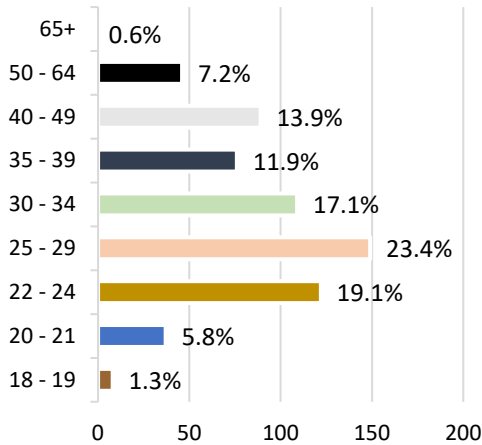

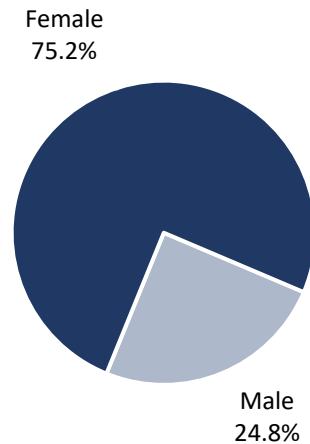

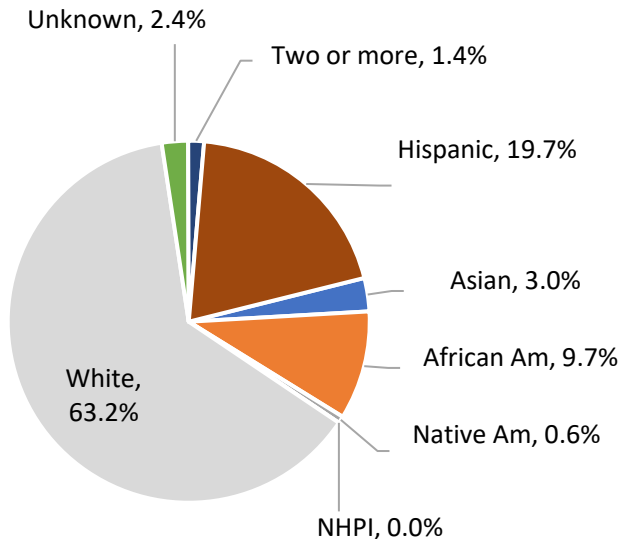

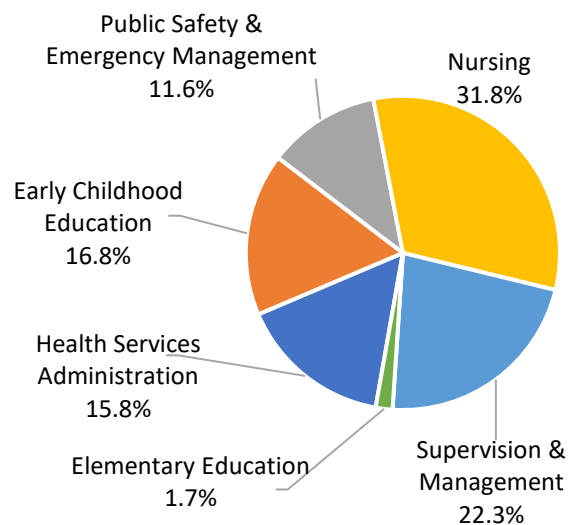

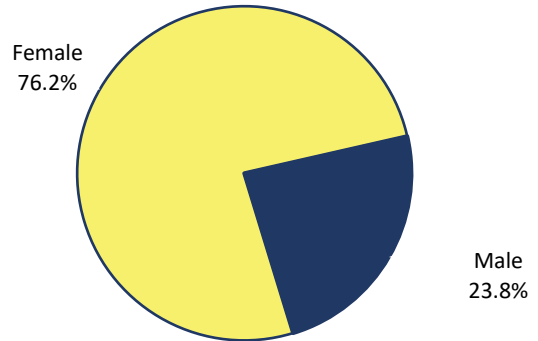

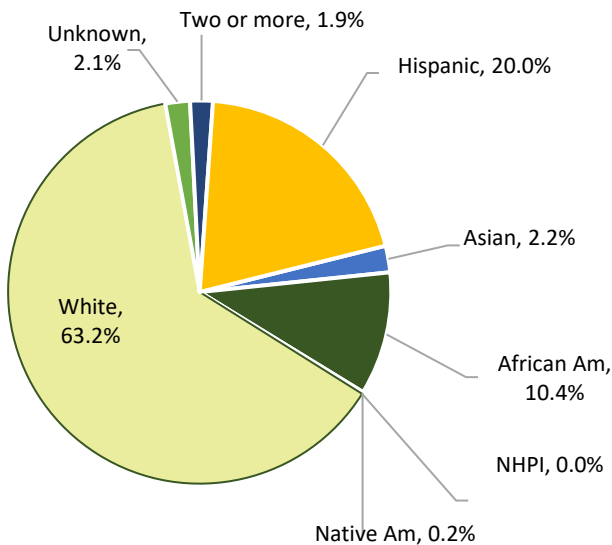

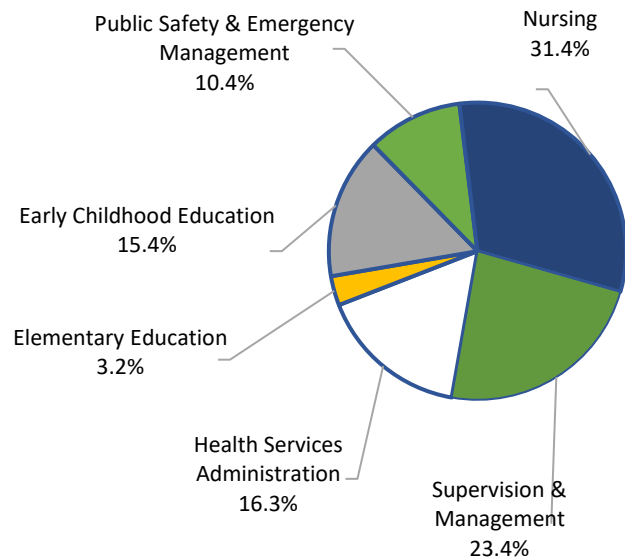

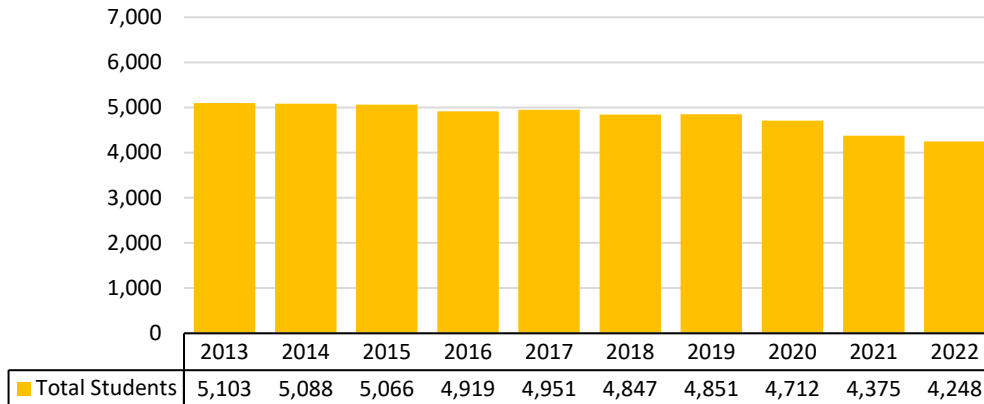
Summer 2013-Summer 2022 Credit Students by Gender

Summer 2013-Summer 2022 Credit Enrollment Headcount



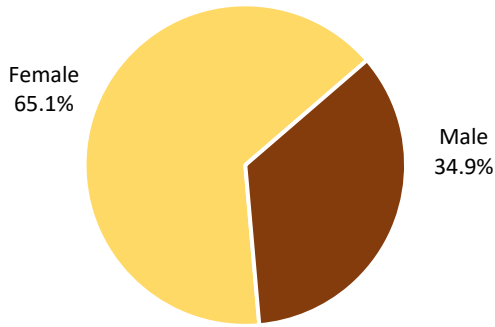

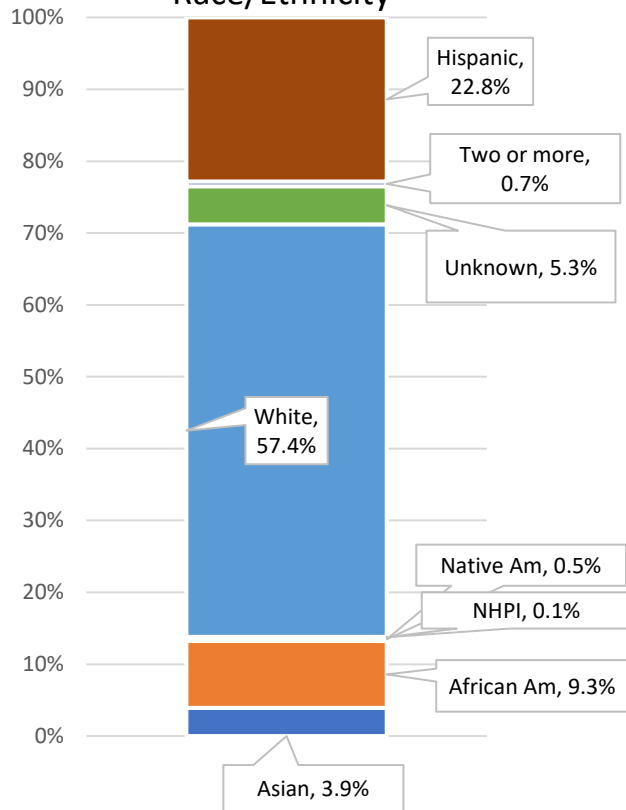

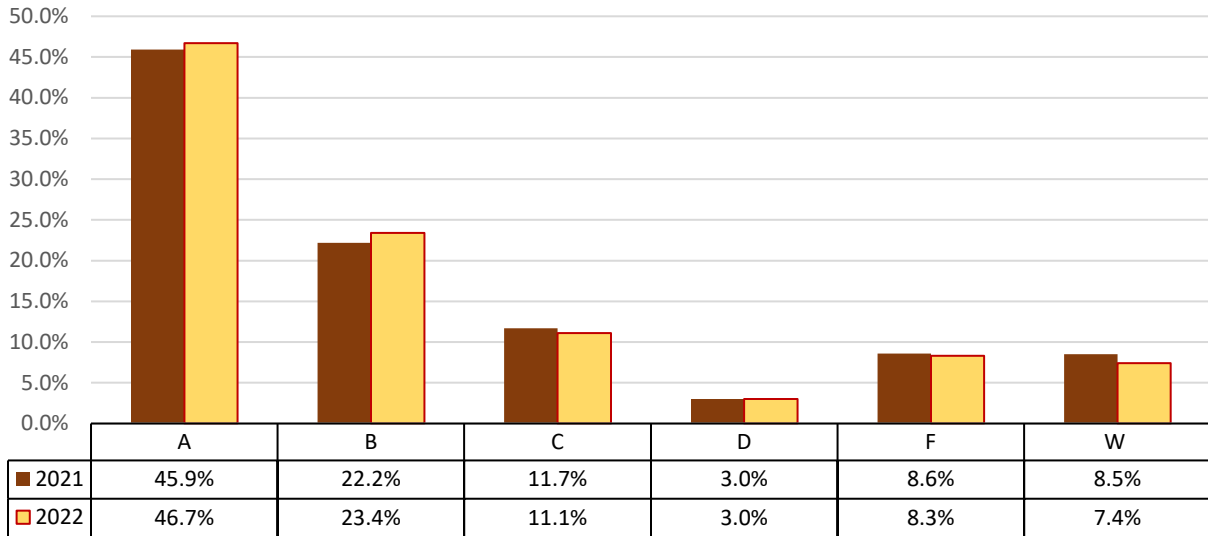

Student Progress Summer 2021-2022 Grade Distribution

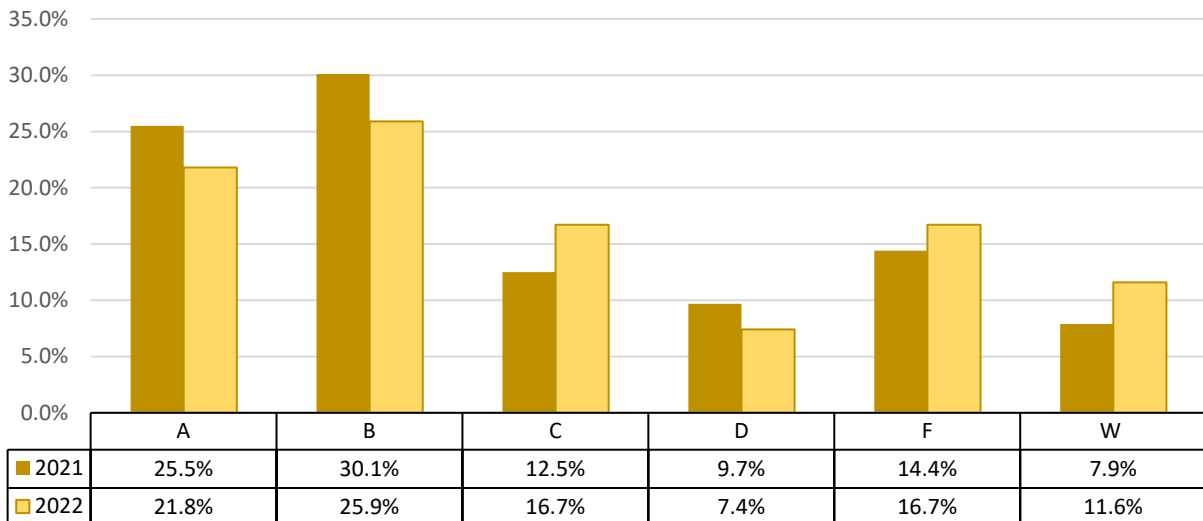
Summer 2021-2022 Total Classes

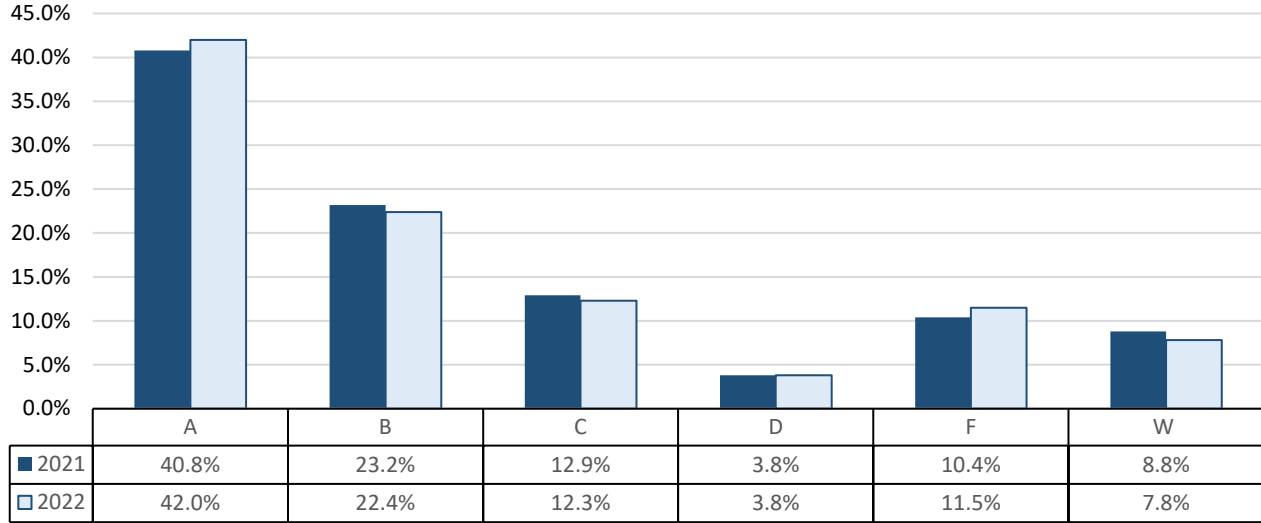

Student Progress Fall 2021-2022 Grade Distribution

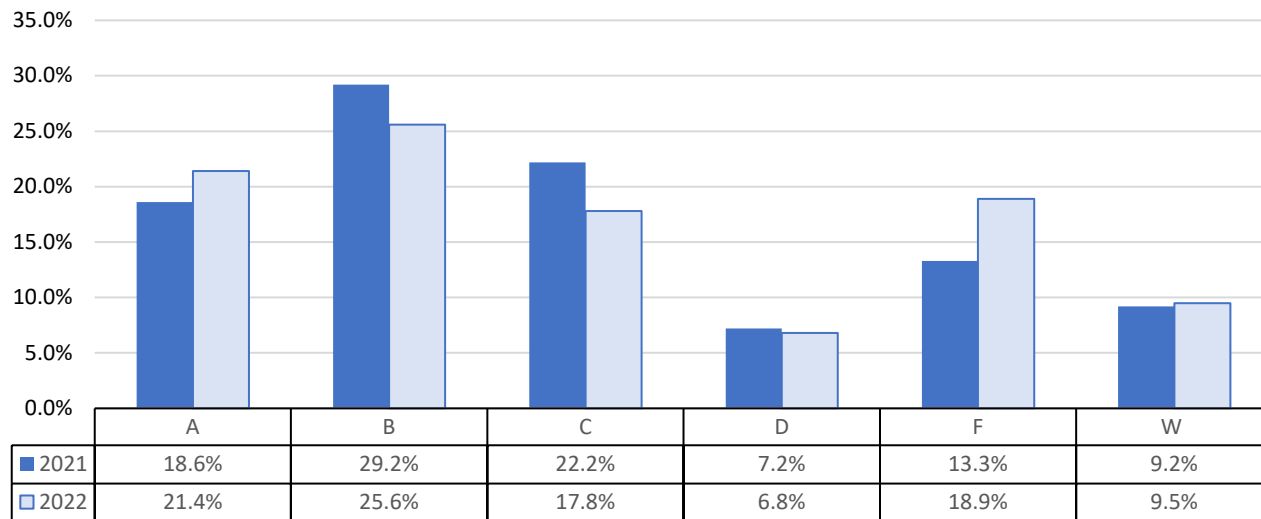
Fall 2021-2022 Total Classes*

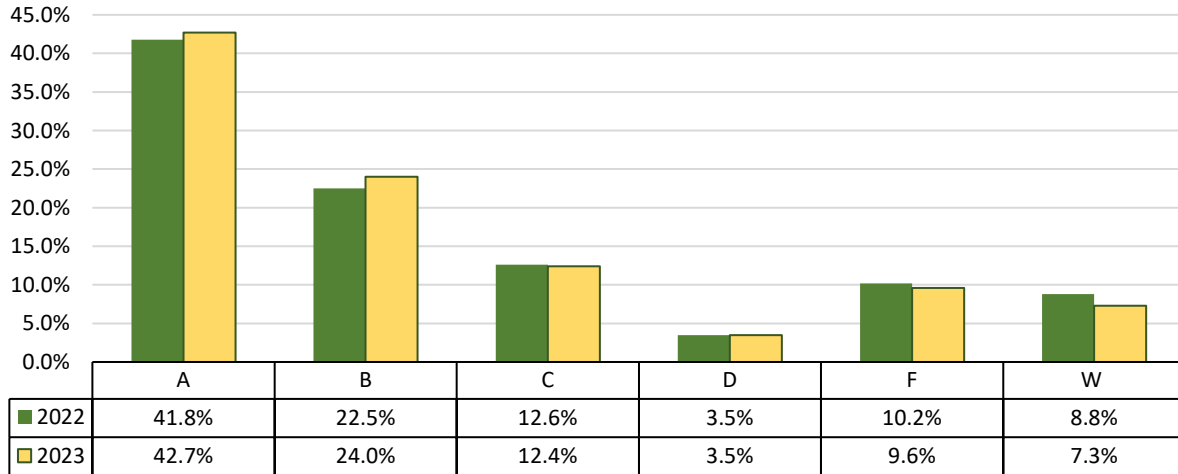

Student Progress Spring 2022-2023 Grade Distribution

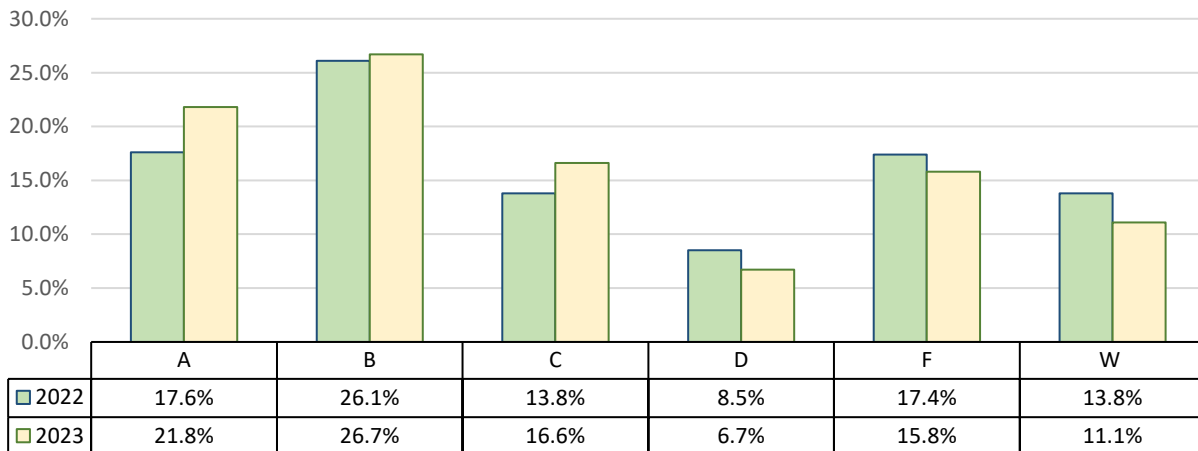

Library Services

Mission: The SCF libraries engage students, faculty, staff and community members in the discovery and creation of knowledge.

Library Collection and Use

The library provides resources and services that facilitate the research, study, spaces for online testing, scholarship and intellectual pursuits of our college community. Resources include physical collections of books, movies, magazines, journals, newspapers, calculators, models, nursing kits, robotics kits, games, architectural Legos, long term laptop loans and miscellaneous equipment.

Print resources not available in SCF libraries can be borrowed from other libraries, through the interlibrary loan program. Digital collections include eBooks, streaming video, eJournals, Audiobooks and proprietary databases/indexes containing the full text of journals, magazines, government documents, radio, television broadcasts, newspapers, legal publications and more.

The librarians provide professional reference assistance and teach information literacy across the curriculum through individualized or group, Face-to-Face(F2F), in Teams or online chat library instruction.



Each library offers quiet and collaborative study spaces, group study rooms, presentation practice rooms, computers, MS Hubs, Wi-Fi, printing and copying. Bradenton and Venice locations also have access to software to support the curriculum, such as SolidWorks and the Adobe Editing Suite. Additional resources include a 3D printer, large format printer and green walls for video recording. Bradenton also hosts a music editing lab and a family friendly study room.

In 2022-2023 the libraries:

- Continued to expand its support of laptops and hotspots for long-term checkout by digitally insecure students, especially in light of Hurricane Ian during the Fall 2022 semester.
- Continued to provide testing spaces to support Honorlock online testing.
- Completed a Library Program review according to our self-assessment schedule (completed every five years).
- Instituted a support process for faculty who suspect student misuse of generative A.I. tools.

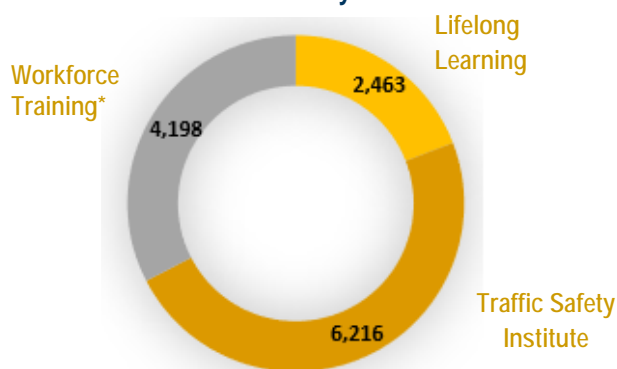

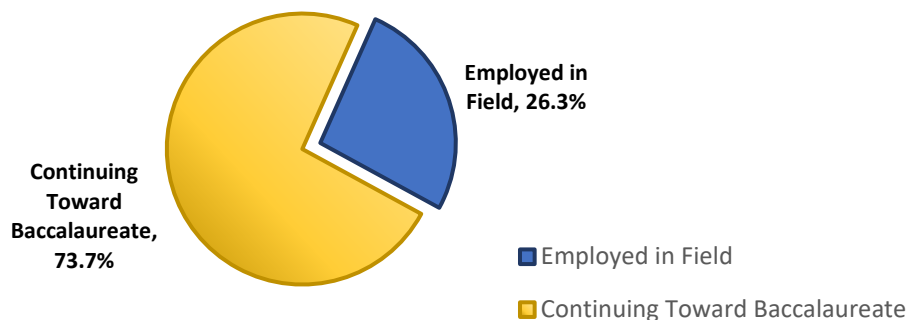

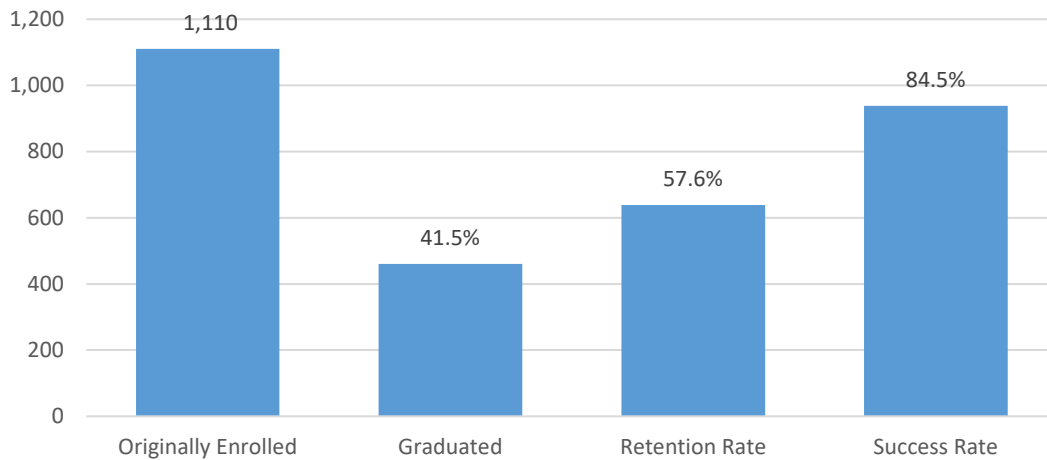

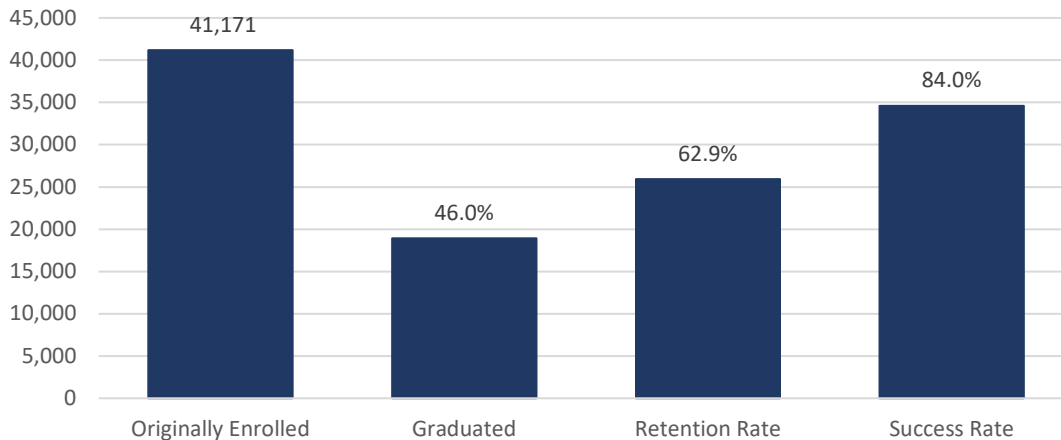

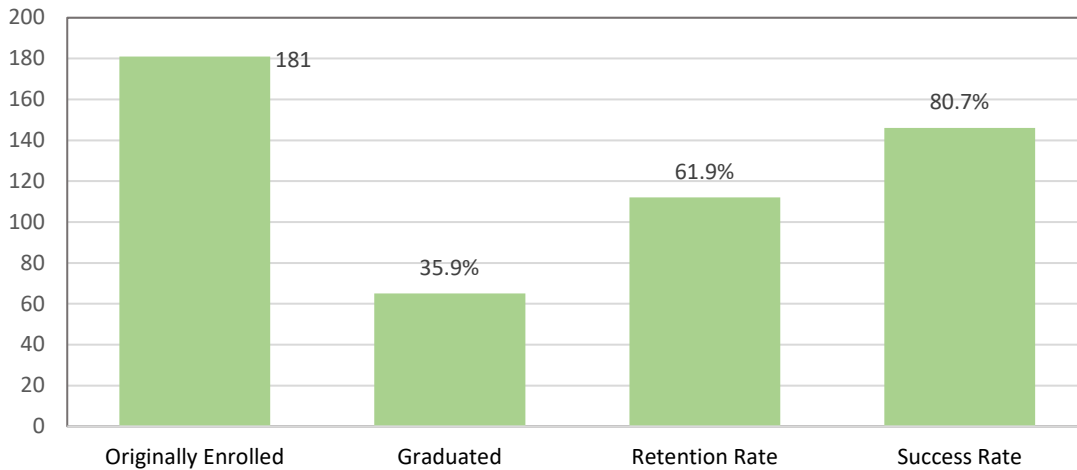

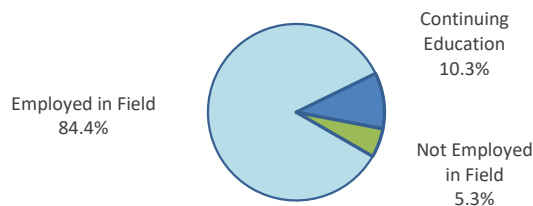
SCF students receiving an Associate in Science degree (A.S.) or an Associate in Applied Science degree (A.A.S.), as depicted in the chart, have been successful in securing employment in their chosen fields or continuing their education.

Placement data is gathered by the Florida Education and Training Placement Information Program (FETPIP) from various sources. FETPIP uses confidential follow-up data that describe the employment, military enlistment and continuing education experience of those individuals followed. The data are collected by using "record linkage" through the Florida Department of Education, the Agency for Workforce Innovation, US Postal Service and the Department of Children and Families, just to list a few. By linking common data elements in different databases, FETPIP has been successful in generating and providing useful follow-up data on former students about their continuing education and/or job placement in the state of Florida.

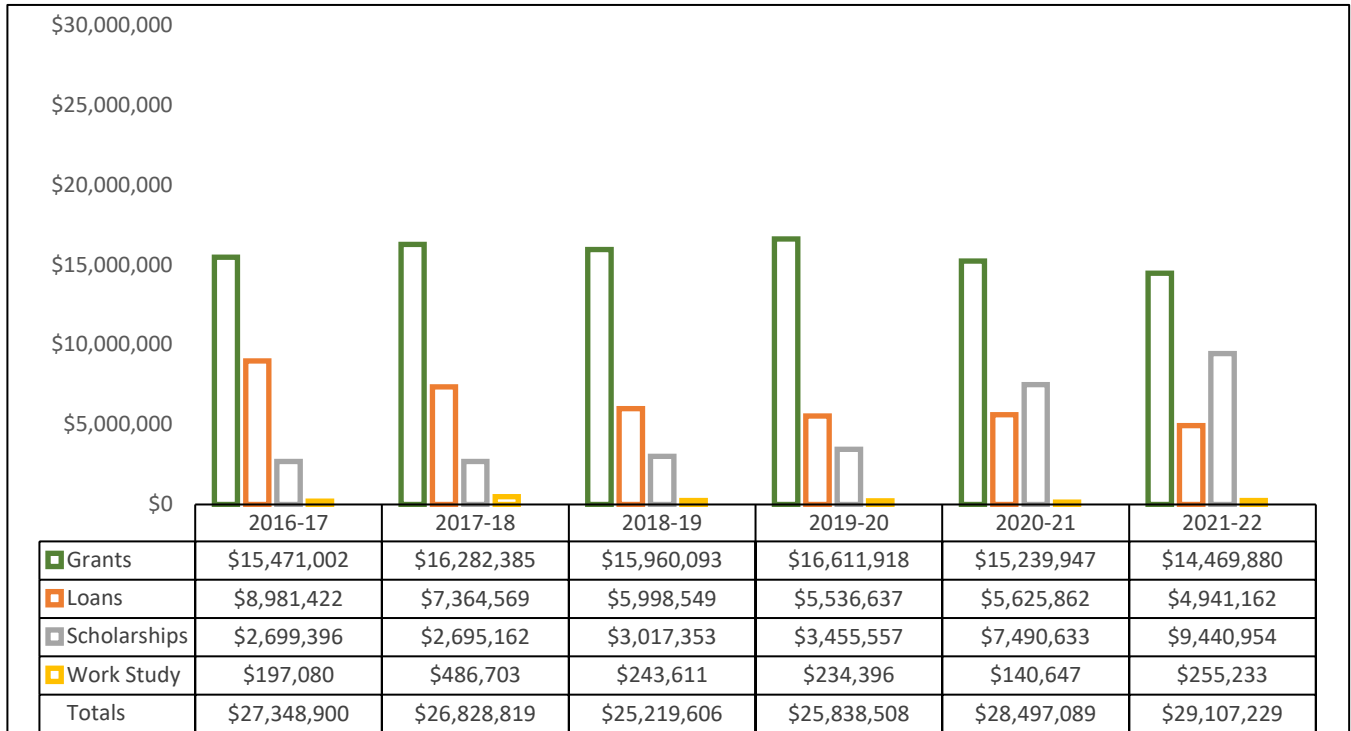

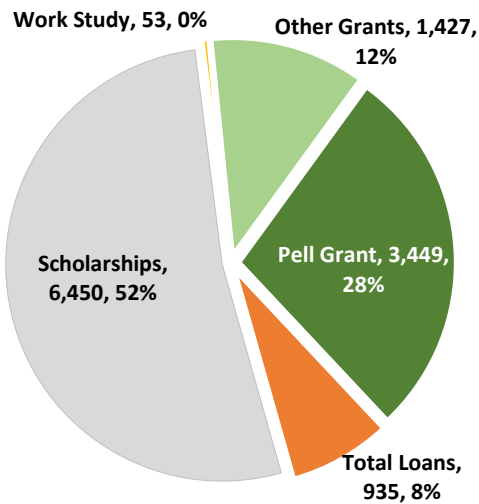

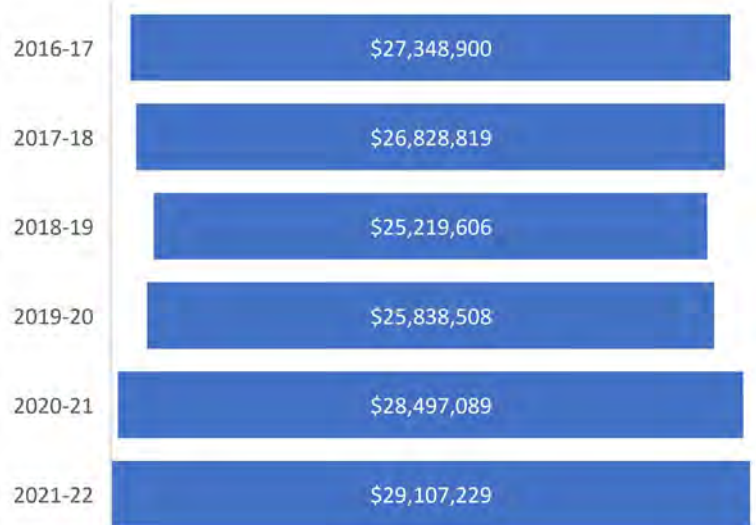

2021-22**



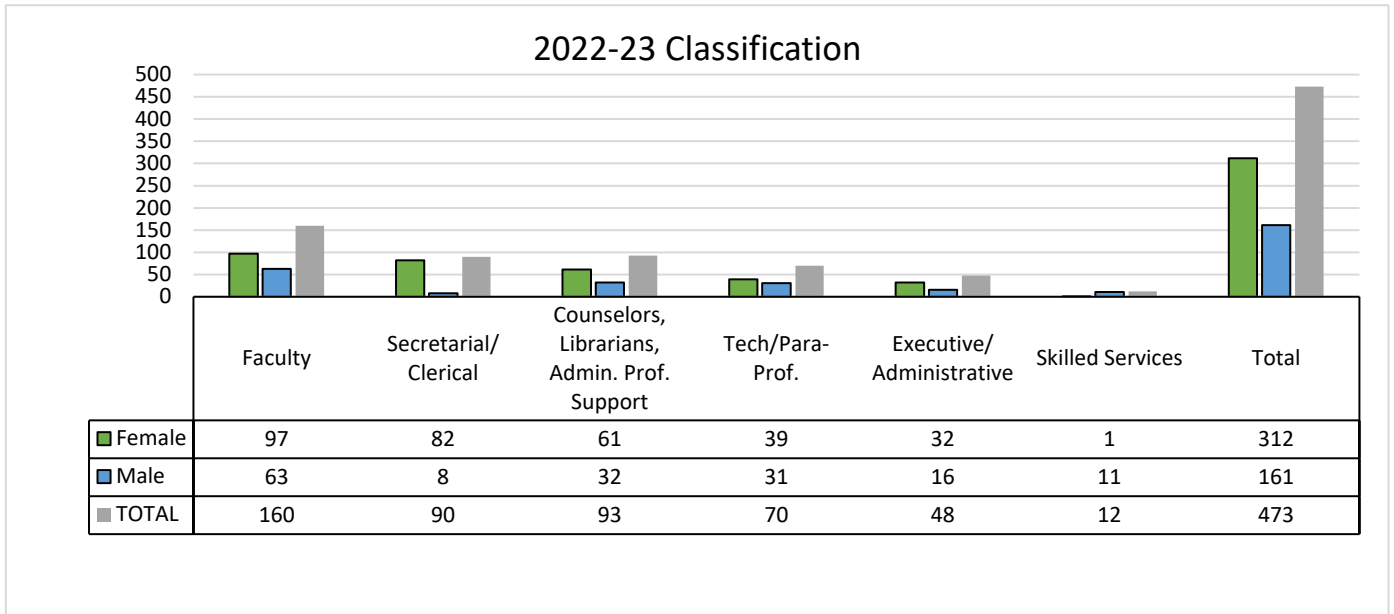
**Grants, Scholarships, Loans and Work Study
Totals in Dollars 2016-2017 through 2021-2022**



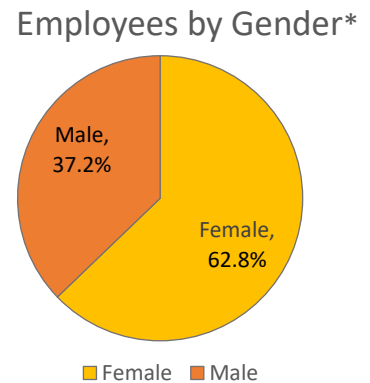
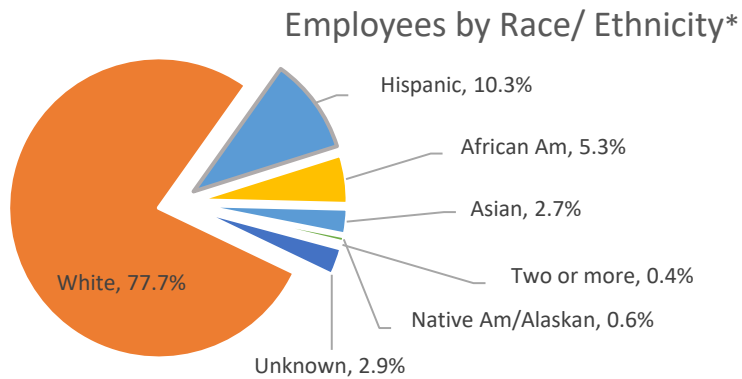

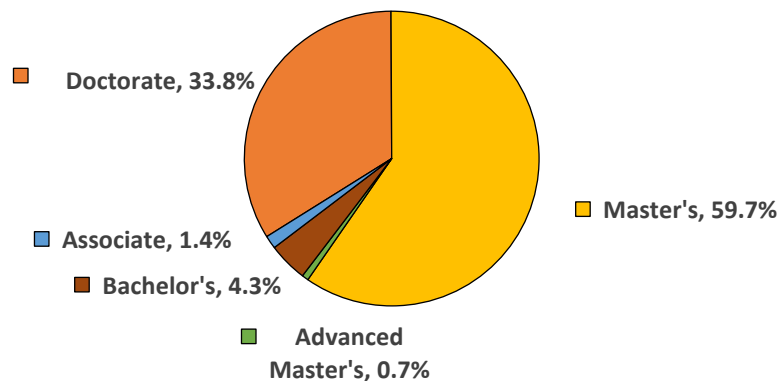
Full-Time Employees by Classification, Race and Gender 2022-23



State College of Florida, Manatee-Sarasota (SCF) has 473 full-time employees. The full-time teaching faculty represents 29 percent of this total. SCF also employs 295 well-qualified adjunct instructors to supplement full-time teaching faculty in the delivery of academic offerings. The minority composition of full-time employees is 22.3 percent. Of SCF's full-time faculty, 33.8 percent are professors with doctorate degrees and 60.4 percent have master's degrees.

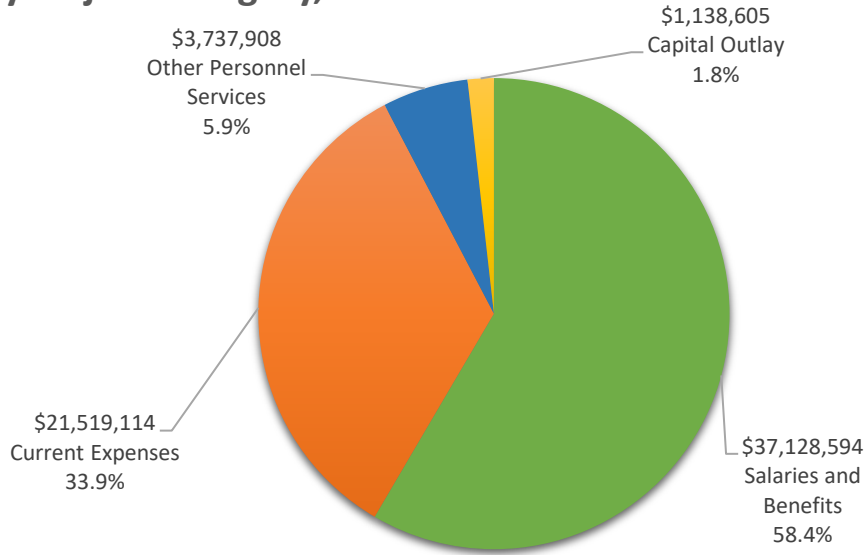

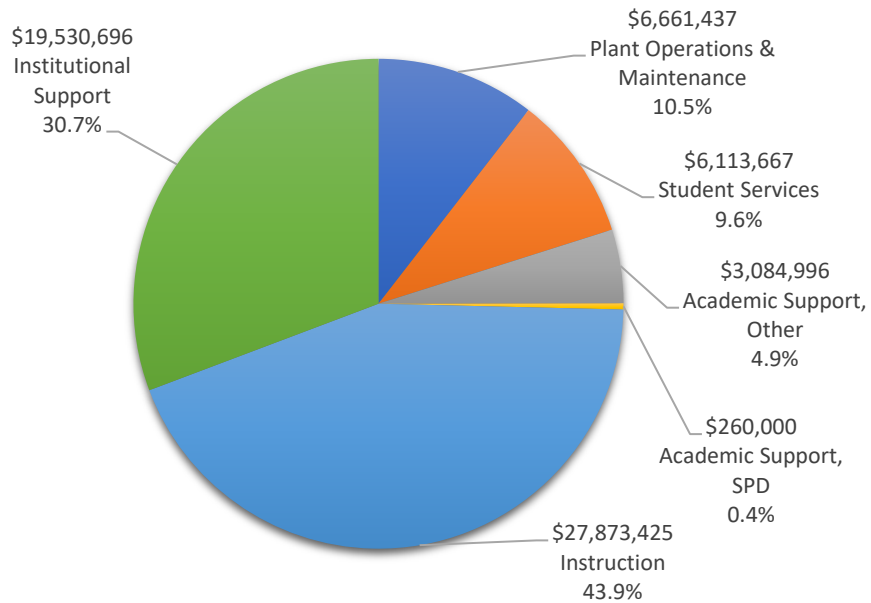

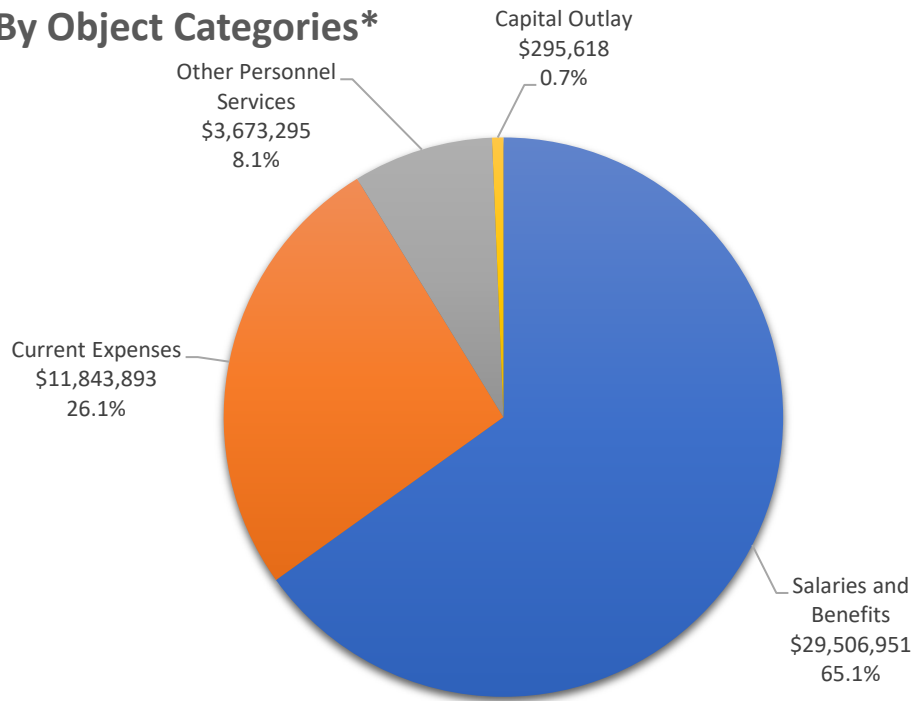

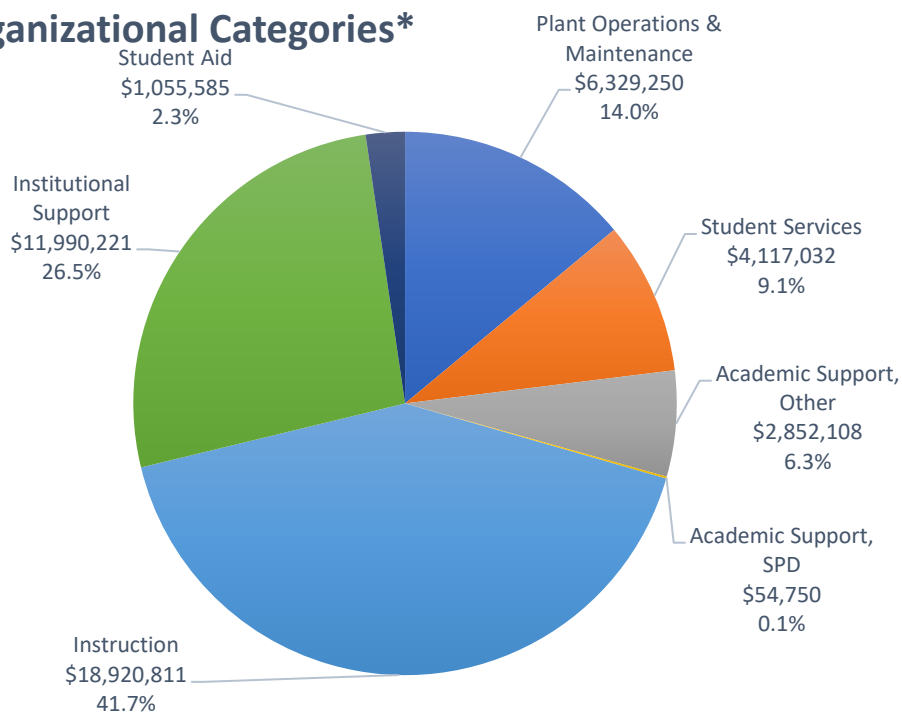

Glossary of Terms

A.A. degree - The Associate in Arts (A.A.) degree allows students to transfer to upper division college programs and universities to complete four-year degrees. Students may enter as juniors in their chosen major as long as core prerequisites have been met.

A.A.S. degree - The Associate in Applied Science (A.A.S.) degree prepares graduates for immediate entry into the workplace. SCF has ended all A.A.S. programs. It stopped admitting new students into these programs in fall 2013 and offered courses for program completion through summer 2015. Any former A.A.S. majors should contact the corresponding A.S. degree program manager for appropriate advising.

A.S. degree - The Associate in Science (A.S.) degrees offer articulation to Florida public colleges/universities that award baccalaureate degrees in matching disciplines. Credit will transfer and allow students to enter as a junior provided all admission requirements and common core prerequisites for the discipline have been met.

Accountability Measures - The Florida Legislature developed specific criteria by which the instructional and administrative efficiency and effectiveness of Florida community/state colleges are measured.

B.A.S. degree - The Bachelor of Applied Science (B.A.S.) degree is associated with programs designed to accommodate the unique demands for entry and advancement within specific workforce sectors.

Blended Courses - Courses taught partly in the classroom and partly online.

B.S. degree - The Bachelor of Science (B.S.) degree is awarded for completion of an undergraduate course of study usually lasting for four years (full-time). This designation is normally used for undergraduate degrees outside of liberal arts studies.

B.S.N. degree - The Bachelor of Science in Nursing (B.S.N.) degree program provides current registered nurses (RN) with the opportunity to obtain a bachelor's degree in nursing.

College Preparatory Courses - Non-exempt, First-Time-In-College students who apply for degree programs are placed in college preparatory courses when their college entry test scores in basic skill areas are below the level set by the Florida State Board of Education.

Community College Survey of Student Engagement (CCSSE) - Assesses students' level of engagement in different aspects of the college experience.

Credit - Classes earn varied hours of college credit that count toward a degree.

Entry Level Testing (ELT) - Placement tests are required for non-exempt First-Time-In-College students seeking a degree from SCF. The test instruments include the Postsecondary Educational Readiness Test (PERT), SAT I and ACT.

Exempt students - As per SB 1720, students who entered a Florida public high school (ninth grade) during the 2003-2004 school year or any year thereafter and graduated with a Florida standard high school diploma or are active-duty armed forces personnel are exempt from taking any entry level testing. They are also exempt from having to enroll in any college preparatory courses.

First-Time-In-College (FTIC) - First-Time-In-College (FTIC) students are students who enter the College having never attended college previously at this or any other institution.

Florida College System (FCS) - The Florida College System (FCS) is made up of 28 locally governed public state/community colleges, which are coordinated under the jurisdiction of the State Board of Education.

Grade Point Average (GPA) - The grade point average is computed by calculating the total number of points earned for all courses divided by the total number of credits taken.

Load Hour - A load hour is equal to a semester hour for college credit and/or preparatory courses.

Online Learning - Online Learning describes courses conducted outside a traditional classroom setting using online courses, blended courses, videotapes, television courses and videoconferencing. The instructor may not be in the same classroom as the student.

Placement Rate - Follow-up data that describe the employment, military enlistment and continuing education experience of A.A., A.S., A.A.S. and certificate graduates.

Survey of Entering Student Engagement (SENSE) - Assesses the entering students' level of engagement in different aspects of the college experience.

SUS - Public universities in the Florida State University System: FAMU, FAU, FGCU, FIU, FPU, FSU, NCF, UNF, UCF, UF, USF and UWF.

Unduplicated Headcount - Unduplicated headcount enrollment is a count of the number of students enrolled in a specified period (i.e., term, academic year) with each individual student counted **only** once.
